

**CAVE IN, BUT NO LOSSES**  
Two Irate Brunswick Ave Men Give Works Committee Some Fun.  
The Hottest Pavement Squabble Yet and They Are Always Exciting—Joe Chamberlain Writes the Mayor an Autograph Letter—Board of Control Grants \$1000 to New Westminster Fire Station—The City Hall.

The Board of Works started on the task with a chaotic meeting yesterday afternoon. Chairman Saunders seemed to have lost control, and for over an hour the committee was given up to the unstrained, splendid recitations of varieties of cedar, asphalt or brick on certain streets. When the meeting adjourned, a bitter quarrel between the two members of the committee, and the result was a letter from the committee, signed by the two members, to the Mayor, in which they stated that they were not prepared to accept the decision of the Board of Works, and that they were going to take the matter to the Board of Control.

Messrs. G. G. S. Lindsey and White, on behalf of brick, also engaged in somewhat more strenuous fashion. Messrs. J. M. Cook and Campbell, who wanted asphalt on Major-street, Messrs. Campbell and White accused one another of little discreditable practices. The result was that the committee was given up to the unstrained, splendid recitations of varieties of cedar, asphalt or brick on certain streets.

The application of the Dominion Paving and Contracting Company for the laying of the city, of some 200 feet of brick on Shaw-street to protect their new industry was referred to the City Engineer.

Then came the old scheme for the extension of the Bloor-street car tracks from Lansdowne to Dundas-street. Ald. J. J. Graham pronounced it a waste of money, but Ald. Lamb would not be a party to it until he learned what it would cost the city. He finally secured a promise of referring the question of liability for cost of gates to the Solicitor.

**Crane and Woods' Motions Pass.**  
The motion of Ald. Woods to instruct the Legislation Committee to prepare a bylaw to prohibit cattle running on Palmerston-avenue was sent to the Property Committee. Ald. Crane's plan to make a west end dumping ground of the lakeshore at Exhibition Park was submitted to the Engineering Committee for a report as to advisability and cost.

**AGUINALDO GETTING SCARED.**

London, Sept. 12.—The Hong Kong correspondent of "The Daily Mail," telegraphing Sunday, says: "Aguinaldo is becoming frightened of the future. He is removing his headquarters to Molina, the present position being too much at the mercy of the Americans. Many of the best men in the insurgent camp are deserting and going to live in Manila. They are disgusted with Aguinaldo's attitude toward the Americans, who have been most forbearing. A wonderful change has come over Manila. The careworn look formerly on everybody's face has disappeared. There is hope in the air. The rebels are being driven back by the air of conquerors, some with rifles, others with bayonets. The American soldiers have flooded the banks and are changing gold dollars into silver."
