SERIOUS DAMAGE TO WHEAT

Chicago Futures Advanced Another Cent and a Half.

But There is Still a Big Short Interest Which Believes the European Wheat Situation Will Offset the Shortcoming in the American Yield-Corn Market - Liverpool Easter-Notes and Gossip.

Wednesday Evening, April 19. Liverpool wheat futures to-day closed at 4 1/2 and 1/2 per cent below yesterday's last quotations.

Chicago wheat futures advanced about a cent and a half a bushel today and closed at about the top figures of the season.

Liverpool maize to-day declined 1/2 per cent. Chicago corn futures today advanced 1/2 to 3/4 cent.

Wheat receipts at Milwaukee and Duluth to-day 150 cars, against 212 the corresponding day of 1889.

Exports to New York to-day: Flour 970 barrels and 11,250 sacks; wheat, 23,881 bushels.

Large Supply at Chicago. Chicago, April 19.-Owing to the large supply of cattle to-day buyers held back and trading was unusually slow with prices falling largely 1/2c lower. Fancy grades brought, \$5.70 to \$5.85; choice steers, \$5.30 to \$5.65; mediums, \$4.65 to \$4.85; beef steers, \$4 to \$4.60; stockers and feeders, \$3.75 to \$3; cows and heifers, \$3.40 to \$4.25; western fed steers, \$4.20 to \$4.30; Texas steers, \$3.70 to \$4.00; calves, \$3.50 to \$4.10.

There was an active demand for hogs and prices ruled strong at an average advance of five cents; fair to choice, \$3.92 1/2 to \$4.05; heavy packers, \$3.70 to \$3.90; mixed, \$3.75 to \$3.97 1/2; butchers', \$3.75 to \$4; light, \$3.70 to \$3.95; pigs, \$3.35 to \$3.55.

London Markets Active. New York, April 19.-The Commercial Advertiser's financial cable from London says the market here was active and cheerful to-day. Americans were steady at parity, but fell all the afternoon, when New York bought Southern Railway, Norfolk & Western, Louisville & Nashville, and later St. Paul. The close was firm. The dealings were entirely by arbitrage; \$80,000 in gold bars was bought by the bank. The week's influx was \$202,000.
