An Astronomical Investigator Discusses Recent Events-Sun Spots and Storms.

W. B. Musson of the local astronomical society was called on last night by a World reporter in search of information. The World wanted to know if the society was taking any steps in regard to securing the meteor which fell at Shelburne the other day, and whether it would prove of any scientific value. Mr. Musson was not able to say anything as to this, as the institute is closed during the summer months, and he did not know whether any of the members were interesting themselves in the matter or not.

"The falling of a meteor is of comparatively common occurrence," Mr. paratively common occurrence," Mr. Musson said, "and the chief interest in such a one as fell at Shelburne is on account of its size. Great numbers of meteors come plunging into the earth's atmosphere from space, but of these very few reach the earth. Traveling as they do at a rate of from tent of forty-five miles a second, they are burned out at an average of say 50 miles from the surface. Another thing is the conflicting opinions as to the direction of flight and place of fall in most cases reported, people many mil's most cases reported, people many mills apart insisting that a meteor had traveled right overhead and must have fallen only a mile or so away. Many cases reported, too, lead to wild goose cases reported, too, lead to wild goose chases; as a person on seeing anything coming at him at such a rate is not apt at the moment to take particular notice of the exact spot where it hits. On looking for the cause of his fright, he is likely to pick on some inoffensive rock as the oftending meteor, and the investigator has to go sadly home again. So a really authenticated fall is of some interest, particularly if the time and prevailing atmospheric conditions at the time are noted."
