

Revised Returns

Leave McKinley Still a Long Way Ahead.

Only Two States Left in the Doubtful Column.

Chairman Jones Still Claiming Bryan's Election.

The Success of "Sound Money" Electrifies Financial Circles.

New York, Nov. 5.—Returns reduce the doubtful States to two—California and North Dakota. Washington, Wyo., Kansas, and Nebraska are transferred to the Bryan column, and Delaware, Oregon, South Dakota, Indiana, and Kentucky are placed in the McKinley column. The vote in Kentucky is close, but advice says the State goes Republican by a small plurality. Delaware and Oregon are also close States, but are apparently carried by McKinley. The later news from California and North Dakota is that in the precincts so far counted McKinley leads, but the margin of votes is so small that both States should be still classed as doubtful. Late returns indicate that the electoral vote of the States will be cast as follows:

Without California and North Dakota, McKinley apparently has 265 votes, or 41 more than is necessary to elect. The loss of Delaware, Oregon, Kentucky, South Dakota and Minnesota would still leave McKinley's votes over the 244.

BULLETINS.

Michigan—Late estimates give Pinckney 56,850 majority in Michigan and McKinley 48,390.

Oregon—Full returns from all but six small counties give McKinley 24,564; Bryan, 31,709; McKinley's majority, 3,245.

South Dakota—This State is surely Republican, and will elect two Republican congressmen and the full State ticket.

Texas—Conservative estimates give Bryan 15,000 plurality, and concede the election of 12 out of 13 Congressmen.

Vermont—Republican, 45,510; Democratic, 8,965; National Democratic, 1,268; Prohibition, 665; Populist, 438; Republican plurality, 20,545.

Virginia—Six hundred and fifteen precincts give a net Democratic plurality of 13,700, representing about two-fifths of the State.

Kentucky—Republican figures give McKinley to McKinley by 5,249, while Democratic estimates give it to Bryan by 2,725.

North Carolina—Bryan will have 20,000 majority in North Carolina.

Indiana—Republicans have carried the State by 15,000 to 17,000.

Nebraska—Official returns from Nebraska, including Lancaster and Douglas, the heavy Republican strongholds, give Bryan 56,855; McKinley, 50,625.

Missouri—Plurality for Bryan, 60,000. Stevens, for Governor, will have a plurality of 40,000.

JONES' CLAIM.

Chairman Jones, of the Democratic National Committee at Chicago, says he has evidence which indicates that Bryan has carried Kentucky, Indiana and Michigan. He says: "We cannot lose. The Republicans are perpetrating frauds. Indiana is for Bryan. Iowa's later returns are our way. Our people say Kentucky is all right. California and Oregon have gone for Bryan. I have no fear of West Virginia, and I do not concede McKinley's election." Mr. Jones' statement is not borne out by the returns received up to this hour.

THE DETROIT ELECTIONS.

The men undoubtedly elected on the Detroit city and county ticket are: Durfee, judge of Probate; Chipman, sheriff; McLeod, treasurer; Reynolds, county clerk; Marschner, registrar; Frazer, prosecuting attorney; Lou Burt, auditor; Hurst and Woodruff, Circuit Court commissioners.

For county auditor, Lou Burt is elected, and his majority over Deibel will be between 7,000 and 8,000.

For Circuit Court commissioners, Hurst and Woodruff will beat Donahue and Jeffries by 6,000.

Dickson and Forth were elected coroners by 6,000 over Barry and Walsh.

Breckinridge's lead and elects Settle (Dem.) to Congress by about 1,500.

WHAT BRYAN SAYS.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 5.—Mr. Bryan says: "The Democratic National Committee claims enough States to give a majority in the electoral college, but the vote is very close in several of the States, and the result cannot be known positively until the entire vote is counted. In all close contests it is wise for both sides to watch the returns, to guard against the possibility of a mistake, intentional or unintentional."

THE SOUND MONEY DEMOCRATS.

Chicago, Nov. 5.—The Sound Money Democrats have taken steps to recover the control of the name and organization of the old Democratic party, or to organize a new party, under the old name. Speaking of McKinley's election, Vice-Chairman Hopkins, of the Sound Money Democratic Committee, had this to say: "McKinley has been elected by the combined sound money forces of the country, the better elements of both the Democratic and Republican parties having brought about the signal result."

Sound Money.

Defeat of the Silverites Sends Up Stocks.

Jubilations in the Montreal Wall Street and London Exchanges.

IN WALL STREET.

New York, Nov. 5.—To no place in the broad land was the news of McKinley's election more grateful than to Wall Street. It was not remarkable, therefore, that that locality was yesterday morning in a state of excited hilarity, which was only tempered by keen appreciation of the dangers escaped, and by the necessity of attending to business. The opening was at a phenomenal market strength.

On enormous transactions stocks opened at gains from 1 to 7 points. Several brokers had established order books, which were kept open all night, that their clients could take advantage of the London market, which opens five hours earlier than the New York Exchange, owing to the difference in time.

It was estimated that orders were sent to London aggregating a quarter of a million shares. Many of these were limited as to price, of course, so the business actually done cannot be estimated. The throng of spectators in the gallery of the exchange was one of the densest in the history of the institution. At 10 o'clock the gallery was one solid mass of humanity, packed eight deep. At a conservative estimate 1,500 persons were in the gallery while scores of late comers were unable to get admittance.

IN MONTREAL.

Montreal, Nov. 5.—Jubilations and lots of it was the general sentiment on the floor of the Montreal Stock Exchange yesterday. The rows of chairs outside the fence on the door of the Stock Exchange were filled by a crowd of Montrealers, who were every one interested in the local market. The "call," which opens the morning's business, which is usually so hazy and uninteresting, was a new aspect in the morning. As the stocks were called one by one, after a few minutes, the floor of the exchange was a scene of activity, with buyers and sellers talking at once. Commercial stock had a rise of 2 points yesterday's quotations, and Postal Telegraph had a 6 point advance. The other stocks followed the general tenor of the market in like proportion. Cable, which sold yesterday at 147, was bid and sold straight up to 156 1/2. Toronto Railway, which was 69 yesterday, sold at 71 1/2. Pacific was 69 bid, and Postal 36 1/2 and 37, and sold at 37 and 38 yesterday. Street Railway sold at 218 and 218 1/2, and Montreal Gas sold at 179. There was never on the floor of the exchange has so much stock changed hands in so short a time. In Cable alone over 100,000 shares were sold in lots varying from 25 shares up to 750 shares.

London, Nov. 5.—Walter Byness, of the American banking house of Morgan & Co., is authority for the statement that enormous orders have been received for the purchase of stocks of merchandise, many of which have been pending the election of McKinley.

Rome, Nov. 5.—The victory of McKinley in the Presidential election in America has met with an ecstatic expression in banking and business circles here. The Bourse showed a great deal of animation today and rents have risen.

London, Nov. 5.—Besides the election of McKinley, the delivery of the 100,000,000 francs in the French Chamber of Deputies by M. Hanotaux, Minister of Foreign Affairs, is a source of great satisfaction to all the European houses.

IMPALED ON A PITCHFORK.

He lay on the ground, and his large bloodhound dragged him some distance toward the house. Irwin died in a few minutes, and when found an hour later the faithful dog was guarding him, with his head on his master's body.

THIS LOOKS WELL.

Iron and Glass Workers at Pittsburgh Resume on Full Time.

Pittsburgh, Nov. 5.—Orders were issued today for the immediate resumption of the hooper mill of Painter & Sons, and the continuous mill of Jones & Laughlin, the two concerns giving employment to about 500 men.

The 600 employees of the Pennsylvania Railroad shops at Walla, Pa., who have been working eight hours a day, five days a week, were notified that hereafter they will be given ten hours a day for seven days a week. They are paid by the hour.

Boyer, Higbee & Co. have arranged to start their glass plant next Monday, and Phillips & Co. have orders to get their factory ready for operation at once.

SNATCHING NEWSPAPERS.

Provokes a Bloody Fight—Three Men Killed and Three More Will Die.

Winchester, Ky., Nov. 5.—The police fired upon a squad of negroes in the streets of this city, in the light of ten men were wounded, of whom three will die. The police say they were trying to arrest a negro who had snatched papers from a newsboy and tramped them under foot. The negroes resisted and repulsed the police, but they returned with reinforcements. Fifty shots were fired on both sides. Three policemen were wounded slightly. Three negroes were mortally wounded.

UNITED STATES THANKSGIVING DAY.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 5.—Thursday, Nov. 26, has been appointed as a day of thanksgiving throughout the United States by President Cleveland.

In the course of his proclamation announcing this fact, the President says: "The people of the United States should never be unmindful of the gratitude they owe the God of nations for their watchful care, which has shielded them from dire disaster, and pointed out to them the way of peace and happiness. Nor should they ever refuse to acknowledge with contentment and thankfulness the aid and assistance of God's teachings, and to follow with joyful spirit after their own devices. To the end that these thoughts may be quickened, it is fitting that, on a day especially appointed, we should join together in approaching the thrones of grace with praise and supplication."

PENHALE VS. PENHALE.

St. Thomas, Nov. 5.—The celebrated cases of Penhale vs. Penhale have been settled. There were two actions. Louisiana Penhale brought suit against her husband, Matthew Penhale, of South Lyon, Mich., to recover \$50 per month alimony. The other action was to rectify a deed of property on Talbot street. Each party claimed three feet of land.

The cases were settled by the defendant giving his wife, Louise Grant, \$500, the wife releasing her right to dower in all her husband's properties. The plaintiff is given a rectified deed for the east nineteen feet of the west half of lot 3 in block 1 on Talbot street. Each party will pay their own costs.

HYMNISM IN THE GAME.

Most people do not believe that hypnotic power plays any part in the game of chess. As long ago as 1857, when Morphy played Paulsen, the former played badly in the opening games of the match through the persistent concentration of his mind on the board during the entire game.

In the later games, as if aware of his mistake, he withdrew his attention from the game when it was not his turn to move, and at once returned to his normal, beautiful, brilliant style of play. The theory of this "hypnotic" play is that a player, by imposing, unconsciously, perhaps, on his more negative opponent as long as Mr. Morphy gave him the opportunity of doing so by dwelling continuously on the game.

How often we hear of the expression, "I can't see anything today," or "Somehow or other, I can never play my game against so and so." In a player under apparently such "control" that he didn't seem to be able to play the game of chess, a player under the simpler features of the play with an effort.

Our remedy for all this kind of thing is simply this: Take your attention from the game when it is not your turn to play, and then you will return to the examination of each new move with at least an approximately normal state of mind.—The Times, Philadelphia.
