Mr. Fielding Says It Will Be Brought Down Then.

The House Spends a Day in Supply-A Wrangle Over Voters' Lists.

Ottawa, April 29.-The greater part of yesterday was spent by the House of Commons in supply. Mr. Foster re-newed his protests in the matter of statutory increases of salaries to officials. The estimates of the departments of agriculture and trade and commerce and for contingencies and legislation were under discussion, and a number of items passed, others being allowed to stand. After recess two hours were spent in discussion of the item of \$2,500 for expenses in connection with the printing of the voters' lists. Members of the opposition charged that the government had assumed the power to override the act of parliament, which demanded that the lists be printed each year. Sir Louis Davies explained that no financial provision had been made for the purpose, that the auditor-general had expressed the opinion that the expenditure was unjustifiable, and that the government intended consulting the house as to the advisability of printing all of the lists each year.

Hon. AT A PISTOL'S POINT

Peculiar Circumstances Attending & Wedding-The Parties Remain Married.

Toronto, April 29 .- A curious case came up before Judge MacMahon at Osgoode Hall yesterday, in the shape of an action to annul a marriage ceremony which took place at King, in this county, last December. The plaintiff is Phillip Schrank, formerly a tanner in King, and his alleged wife is Alice, the daughter of Joe Holdingshead. The plaintiff claims that he was forced into the ceremony by abu dation, etc., emphasized by the presence of a revolver and two guns. He wants the court to declare the alleged marriage ceremony null and void. Schrank, who is about 25, says that on the night of the wedding he visited the girl's house by invitation. As he was putting on his overcoat to leave, the girl's brother called him into a room, where he saw a number of the girl's relatives, a magistrate and a constable. He was accused of ruining the girl, and was asked to marry her. A disturbance followed, and a sister of the girl came in with a revolver, and exclaimed: "You'll be shot!" Then a brother came in with a couple of guns. Under the circumstances the plaintiff accompanied the brother and constable to King City for a marriage license. He did not ask for it, and did not pay for it. He returned to the house, and the marriage ceremony was peacefully performed. Immediately after Schrank left the house, and had not been there since. He had told his wife on leaving that he would never return, and that he would take a dose of poison sooner
