The horse, evidently got worsted in the engagement, losing a large portion of skin. The car also was damaged, having its vestibule window smashed in. The driver escaped unhurt.

London Men Do Not Take Barbers' Strike Seriously

Sale of Razors and Shaving Necessaries Has Not Been Increased in the City.

Evidently the men of London do not take the barbers' strike seriously. For, if any, have fitted themselves out with the necessary implements for "cutting the stubble".

Most of the leading hardware merchants, dealers in sporting goods and cutlery, and other merchants who traffic in razors, razor strops, and other shaving paraphernalia, were interviewed today, and all reported that there has been no increase in the sale of such articles since Saturday.

The druggists were also questioned, and all assert that they have not noticed any increase in the sale of shaving soaps, lotions, powders, etc., since the commencement of the strike.

Just Wait Awhile.

One druggist while speaking of the sale of shaving soap and the influence the strike is liable to have on it, said: "I don't think that the strike has lasted long enough yet to increase the sale of such articles. Of course whiskers have not had sufficient time to establish themselves as a nuisance. They grow longer, however, and the men who have not been in the habit of shaving themselves will attempt the operation once or twice and cut themselves. It is not likely that they will remain self-shavers. It takes time for a man to learn to shave oneself. However, after a man has gone to a barber shop several times when in a great hurry, and has had to wait for perhaps an hour for his turn, he may be tempted to try his hand at the game himself and buy a razor and outfit."

No Greater Sales.

A prominent hardwareman said to The Advertiser: "We have not sold any more razors or strops since the commencement of the strike and I question whether we will have our sale of such goods materially increased, unless the strike is a long-drawn-out affair. We have sold a great many razors during the last few months, and the trend of the times seems to be for men to shave themselves. Besides there are few men who have not at some time purchased a razor and attempted self-shaving and most of those who are shaving themselves, now that the strike is on, will be using the old razor, in the hope that the trouble will soon be over. We find that most of those who shave themselves are among the working classes and they have always shaved themselves and always will."

"Of course there will be a difference in haircuts after a short time, if the strike keeps up. Hair will grow, and men cannot cut their own hair. Their wives may cut it and unless we sell a few lawn mowers for that purpose, I cannot see where we will profit along that line. Anyway, it will be a month before the hair will have grown much too long, and by that time we hope that the strike will be settled."

Razor Sharpeners' Profit.

The only persons who have profited by the strike are those who sharpen razors.

They report an increase in trade along that line. One repair man said: "Yes, we are getting all the old razors to sharpen up. Business is fine."
