NO HALFWAY MEASURES

The Evacuation of Crete by Turks Must Be Complete.

Canea, Crete, Oct. 14.—The foreign admirals have communicated with their respective governments, protesting against the port's demand that it be allowed to retain three fortified places in the island, with garrisons sufficient to safeguard the Mohammedans and protect the Turkish flag.

The admirals say that the sultan should not be allowed to maintain any troops in Crete, and they ask that the Turkish troops be compelled to completely evacuate the island. The admiral has decided not to allow Osman Pasha and Sabit Pasha, who have been ordered to proceed to Crete from Turkey, to superintend the embarkation of the troops, as their presence would only complicate the situation and lead to idle discussion.

The port's reply to the powers did not allude to the Turkish civil officials, and the admirals propose to regard the silence on this point as implying an agreement to their removal.

The Turkish troops are transferring their baggage and arms to the island of Suda, on Suda Bay, east of Canea, to be readied to embark on the steamers which have already left Constantinople to repatriate them.

Great Britain, Russia, France and Italy have decided to reject the port's modifications in the ultimatum to the Turkish Government on the evacuation of the island of Crete, particularly the sultan's proposition to hold three fortified places, with garrisons sufficient to protect the Mohammedans and to defend the Ottoman flag. They are sending an identical note to this effect to Constantinople, reminding the sultan that every Turkish soldier must leave Crete before the time specified in the ultimatum.

HE WAS IN IT.

Big Methodist Split Recalled by the Death of Rev. Elmer Youcum.

Kilborne, Wis., Oct. 14.—Rev. Elmer Youcum is dead, aged 92. Dr. Youcum was a member of the famous general conference held in New York which tried and suspended a bishop for having married a wife who owned slaves, an incident which led to the separation of Methodism north and south.

Dr. Youcum is supposed to have been the only survivor of that historic conference.

EARLIEST IN 26 YEARS.

Chicago Reports Its First Snowfall This Season—A Crockery Smashing Shake-Up in California.

Chicago, Oct. 14.—Snow fell in this city for over an hour last night. It was the first of the season and the earliest in 26 years. A gale accompanied the snowfall, making navigation on Lake Michigan impossible.

THE FOREIGN SECRETARY

Hon. W. St. John Brodriock to Succeed Curzon.

Marquis of Anglesey Dead—Five Generations in a Group—Marine Mishaps—Cable Notes.

London, Oct. 14.—The Right Hon. William St. John Brodriock, member of parliament for the Guildford division of Surrey, and under-secretary of state for war, has been appointed under-secretary of state for foreign affairs, in succession to Lord Curzon of Kedleston, the new Viceroy of India.

FIVE GENERATIONS IN A GROUP.
A unique experience has fallen to the lot of an old fisherman living in the village of Buckle, near Edinburgh. He was photographed this week with his family, showing five generations.

John Murray, the head, is 90 years of age, and is hale and hearty. His son, William Henry, is 69; William's daughter, Margaret, is 38, and Margaret's daughter, also named Margaret, is 18. The last-named has recently presented the world with a son, who thus completes the fifth link in this remarkable family chain.

A further notable thing about the older Murray is that he was the first fisherman in Great Britain to discover the use of herring bait to catch whitefish.

DEAD.

Henry Paget, fourth Marquis of Anglesey, died suddenly yesterday. The late Marquis of Anglesey was born in 1835. His heir is his son, the Earl of Bridge, who was born in 1875, and who is not married.

MARINE MISHAPS.

The board of trade has rendered a decision, blaming the commander of the British steamer Milwaukee (Capt. Williams) for the accident which happened to her on Sept. 16, and his suspended his certificate for three months. The Milwaukee, from Shields, ran ashore near Porter Rock, Scotland, on Sept. 16, and was temporarily abandoned. Later she was cut in two, and the parts were towed into the River Tyne.

The British steamer Lucerne (Capt. Taylor), from St. Johns, Nfld., Sept. 30, for London, while swinging at anchor at Gravesend, was slightly damaged by colliding with the tug Bull Dog.

The British steamer Yola (Captain Jones), from Montreal, Sept. 28, for London, while at anchor at Gravesend, ran into by the steamer Robert Ingham, from Shields. The Yola's starboard bow was damaged, and the Robert Ingham was damaged on the starboard side.

CABLE NOTES.

Serious disturbances have taken place in Taifit, which is one of the great subdivisions of Morocco, and is as a place of banishment for political offenders. A large body of rioters has captured the uncle of the sultan, and attempted to seize the treasure.

The Italia Militare (Rome) announces the imminent hostilities between Emperor Menelik of Abyssinia and Ras Mangascia, the celebrated warrior, who recently seized and poisoned an envoy sent to Menelik's masterful wife, Queen Taitu. Ras Mangascia has asked Italian assistance, which has been refused.

Late dispatches from St. Louis, Senegambia, confirm the reported capture of Chief Samory, all his family and his chiefs. This victory concludes the extensive French operations against this chief.

The rise of the discount rate of the Bank of England from 3 to 5 per cent momentarily upset the markets. People jumped to the conclusion that the rate was due to the war scare and to Lord Rosebery's speech. Calm reflection, however, has shown that it was only a measure of precaution.

THE DOWAGER A USURPER

Charged With Being the Instigator of Murder.

London, Oct. 14.—The Pekin correspondent of the Times says: The foreign legations have not yet been notified by the Tsung-Li-Yamen that the empress dowager has assumed the regency, which daily assumes more the nature of a usurpation. There are numerous indications that the early death of the emperor is expected.

Thirty-three Italian blue-jackets have arrived at Pekin to guard the Italian legation.

THE EMPEROR'S CONDITION.

The British, German and Japanese ministers at Pekin, according to a special dispatch from Shanghai, have vainly sought for a week past an audience of the emperor. An official of the Tsung-Li-Yamen says the emperor is in a dying condition in a small building on a lake near the empress dowager's palace, where no man can penetrate.

A TERRIBLE CHARGE.

A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Shanghai says it is credibly reported that Shang-Ying-Houan, who was recently dismissed from the Tsung-Li-Yamen and from all his other offices, and banished to Ili, Chinese Turkestan, was murdered while en route to the place of his exile, at a secret order of the empress dowager.

THE TOUR OF THE KAISER

Arrival of the Imperial Party at Venice.

The Royal and Imperial Couples Hug and Kiss—William Takes His Favorite Giant With Him—Biggest Soldier in the German Army.

Venice, Oct. 13.—The Emperor and Empress of Germany arrived here at noon and proceeded to the royal palace, where they were welcomed by the King and Queen of Italy. Their majesties were cheered by the crowds which witnessed their arrival. It was noticed that among the decorations at the railway station there were many flags inscribed with the date, "1870," the year of the outbreak of the war between France and Germany.

The meeting between the royal and imperial couples was of the most cordial nature. Emperor William kissed the Empress and the King and Queen of Italy. The Emperor embraced each other. While the meeting was in progress military bands played the national anthems, the emperor and empress accompanied by King Humbert and Queen Margret, were rowed to the palace in
