MEASURES

The Evacuation of Crete by Turks Must Be Complete.

Canea, Crete, Oct. 14.-The foreign admirals have communicated with their against the porte's demand that it be allowed to retain three fortified places in the island, with garrisons sufficient to safeguard the Mohammedans and

protect the Turkish flag. The admirals say that the sultan should not be allowed to maintain any troops in Crete, and they ask that the Turkish troops be compelled to completely evacuate the island. The admirals have decided not to allow Osman Pasha and Sabit Pasha, who have been ordered to proceed to Crete from Turkey, to superintend the em-barkation of the troops, as their presence would only complicate the situation and lead to idle discussion.

The porte's reply to the powers did not allude to the Turkish civil officials, and the admirals propose to regard the silence on this point as implying an agreement to their removal.

The Teurkish troops are transferring their baggage and war material to Suda, on Suda Bay, east of Canea, to bein readiness to embark on the steamers which have already left Constantinople to repatriate them. Great Britain, Russia, France and Italy have decided to reject the porte's

modifications in the ultimatum to the Turkish Government on the evacuation of the Island of Crete, particularly the sultan's proposition to hold three fortified places, with garrisons sufficient to protect the Mohammedans and to defend the Ottoman flag. They are sending an identical note to this effect to Constantinople, reminding the sultan that every Turkish soldier must leave Crete within the time specified in the ultimatum.

HE WAS IN IT.

Big Methodist Split Recalled by the Death of Rev. Elmer Yocum.

Kilborne, Wis., Oct. 14 .- Rev. Elmer Youcum is dead, aged 92. Dr. Yocum was a member of the famous general conference held in New York which tried and suspended a bishop for having married a wife who owned slaves, an incident which led to the separation of Methodism north and south.

Dr. Yocum is supposed to have been the only survivor of that historic conference.

EARLIEST IN 26 YEARS.

Chicage Reports Its First Snowfall This Season-A Crockery-Smashing Shake-Up in California.

Chicago, Oct. 14.-Snow fell in this city for over an hour last night. It was the first of the season and the earliest in 26 years. A gale accompanied the snowfall, making navigation on Lake Michigan impossible.

OF THE KAISER Tar and

Venice.

The Royal and Imperial Couples Hug and Kiss-William Takes His Favorite Giant With Him-Biggest Soldier in the German Army.

Venice, Oct. 13.-The Emperor and Empress of Germany arrived here at noon and proceeded to the royal palace, where they were welcomed by the King and Queen of Italy. Their majesties were cheered by the crowds which witnessed their arrival. It was noticed that among the decorations at the railway station there were many flags inscribed with the date, "1870," the year of the outbreak of the war between France and Germany. The meeting between the royal and imperial couples was of the most cordial nature. Emperor William kissed the hand of the Queen of Italy and King Humbert kissed the hand of the Empress of Germany. The queen and the Empress embraced each other. While the meeting was in progress military bands played the national anthems. The emperor and empress, accompanied by King Humbert and Queen Margaret, were rowed to the palace in the state gondolas, by way of the Grand Canal. The emperor and the king occupied one gondola and the empress and the queen were seated in another gondola. Both the boats were escorted by eight municipal barges, richly ornamented, and were followed by a great flotilla of gondolas. There was great cheering all along the route followed, and enthusiastic crowds of people welcomed their majesties on the piazza of St. Mark. After their majesties had entered the palace, they appeared on a balcony, which brought forth a renewal of the acclamations of the people, and the bands played the German and Italian anthems. The whole town and all the ships in the harbor were gaily decorated. luncheon at the palace the Empress and Emperor of Germany boarded the imperial yacht Hohenzollern, and at 4 p.m. sailed for Constantinople.

WILLIAM'S PET. One of the interesting features of the emperor's tour of the Orient will be Herr Leonard Ehmke, a veritable giant, and the biggest soldier in the German army. He measures within an inch of seven feet and weighs 296 pounds. This big German fighter belongs to the Third Regiment of the Imperial Guards, and the object of the distinction is due to the kaiser's desire to show the Orientals in the imperial processions a true type of the Prussian army. The Czar of Russia sent the Kaiser an autograph letter, wishing him good luck on his journey.

VILLAGE TAKEN BY SNAKES

French Peasants Work Days and Fight the Reptiles at Night-Unique Village in the Ural.

Paris, Oct. 21.-The village of Lapar. ade, in the department of Lot-et-Garonne, is reported to be suffering from a plague of serpents, to such a degree that the reptiles, some of enormous size, boldly crossed the roadways, and already have caused the death of two villagers.

Laparade is situated on the summit of a broad hill overlooking the River Lot. The slopes teem with grapevines. To the north are thick forests intersected with marshes. The abnormal heat of the summer has bred millions of reptiles in the marshes, and they now crawl through the vineyards

surrounding the village. After the men return from work each day they organize themselves into snake-hunting parties, with fatal re-sults to the snakes, but it seems im-

possible to stop the plague. UNIQUE VILLAGE. A dispatch from Moscow reports that news has reached there from the Asiatic borders of the discovery of an entire village, the existence of which is unknown to Russian and European ethnologists and geographers. None of the many tribes in this weird region knew that there was such a village nor have they ever met any of the

inhabitante. The village lies snugly ensconced in the valley of a group of lofty mounrange. The people speak d language of their own, which bears no resemblance whatever to the seventy more languages which prevail in the vast regions of the great White Czar. The travelers who chanced upon this community have been unable to elicit any information regarding their antecedents. Their dress consists principally of animal skins and their huts are

constructed of twisted boughs. The report adds sarcastically, referring to the heavy burdens of the czar's subjects, which have been discovered, of ideal commonwealth, in which taxes and tax gatherers, among other troublesome things, are unheard of. This latter defect, however, is now to be a matter of a few weeks or months before the village partakes of all the advantages and privileges of the Rus-
