COAL FIELDS OF THE WEST ARE FACING A LONG STRIKE

Calgary, May 15.—Unless there is an unlooked-for change in the situation the present prospect in connection with the dispute between the coal miners of District No. 13, United Mine Workers of America, and the Western Coal Operators' Association, is for a prolonged strike which will put up the coal fields of Alberta and British Columbia for an indefinite period. The signs of desire for peace on the part of the miners, and the stand of the employers, to be out of the question, and as the men show no disposition to yield and the operators are just as adamant, it looks as if the dispute would simmer down to a trial of strength between the two parties.

The miners' union received another telegram from Hon. T. W. Crothers yesterday in which he urged them to reconsider their refusal to place the matter in the hands of a royal commission, and intimated there was little chance of Government interference.

HOLLWEG DEFIES ALL WHO DEMAND PEACE

PROPOSAL BY BERLIN

Will Maintain Reticence on Aims Despite All Urgings.

IS ANGLING FOR RUSSIA

Willing To Conclude Separate Peace on Terms That Would Suit.

BERLIN, via London, May 15.—In one of the most vigorous and eloquent speeches he has yet made before the Reichstag since the outbreak of war, the Imperial German Chancellor today bluntly refused to enter into a discussion of Germany's peace aims, as demanded in interpellations by the Conservatives and Socialists. Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg asserted that these called for the government's specific peace program, the announcement of which would at the present time only be premature, but which it would be difficult to formulate, and also of no practical service to the nation in the present situation.

While appreciating the passionate desire of all classes to communicate the government's views, the Chancellor plainly declared that he would not permit himself to be swayed by pressure from any source, and that he would not under the spell of any party or clique.

Waits Till Time Is Ripe. The best interests of the nation, he believed, demanded that the reticence he had imposed on himself in the face of continuous clamor since December, 1915, should be observed by him until the moment was ripe. He was sure that such a course would be endorsed by the nation at large, which continued to rally around him and his government, and also meet the views of the majority of the members of the Reichstag.

The Chancellor then briefly reviewed the present military situation and Germany's relations to the neutrals, in the course of which he warmly praised the attitude adopted by Spain. The Chancellor stated that he saw no signs of desire for peace on the part of the Entente Allies, who he claimed were bent on a war of conquest, and planned the economic destruction of the fatherland.

Referring to Russia, he said that he was quite certain that an agreement could be reached between the two nations that would leave "no sting behind it."

Speaking for the Social Democrats, Philip Scheidemann said that if the Allies abandoned the idea of annexation, and Germany persisted in it, there would be a revolution in Germany. He said he was sure that a peace could be arranged that would not include an alteration of frontiers.

SMUTS SAYS FIGHT IS MADE TO SECURE FUTURE LIBERTIES

Believes Big Problem After the War Is Within the Empire.

London, May 15.—Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency—Lieut.-Gen. Smuts, minister of defence for South Africa and representative of the Union of South Africa at the War Conference, was the guest of the House of Lords and Commons at a banquet given for him at the Royal Gallery, Victoria French president.

Gen. Smuts said that the spirit of comradeship in the battlefields of Europe would be more powerful than any instrument of Government they could erect.

Cleared of Enemy. Our commonwealth would go to pieces if its world-wide communications were not maintained. Germany, during the past 18 months, had settled everywhere. The day would have come when the Empire would have been jeopardized by the cutting of these lines. Now the world outside of Europe had been cleared of the enemy, and we were most providentially brought to the position that we could consider the future problem as a whole.

Gen. Smuts said he hoped when the time for settlement came we would remember that the Empire was not the whole British Empire. He did not wish the Empire to have fought in vain.
