USE MENTAL FORCE ONLY TO DEAL WITH ALIEN LABOR PHASE

So Advises Tom Moore, T. and
L. President.

GOVERNMENT'S QUESTION It Should Not Be Left For Labor To Handle At All.

Regarding the employment of alien
enemies, Tom Moore, president of the
Trades and Labor Congress of Canada,
says that this is a question for the
Government to deal with rather than the
labor forces. The Government allowed
immigration to flow into the country
which the labor men objected to, says
the labor leader, and it is up to it to
do something.

While Mr. Moore thinks the Government
should deal with the question, he
suggests that the soldiers' associations,
employers' organizations, labor repre-
sentatives of the city, and the city officials
should get together and discuss the
alien enemy question.

In connection with this phase of the
problem of reconstruction, the president
of the Trades and Labor Congress urges
the mental force of master minds rather
than physical force of any kind.

That labor forces of Canada are in
accord with the employment of Cana-
dians first, in all instances, is evidenced
by the fact that a request has been pre-
sented to the Government to the effect
that on all public works only Canadian
labor shall be employed except where
such labor is not procurable.

Mr. Moore thinks the whole question
could be easily settled if the various in-
terested elements of the city would get
together and discuss the different phases
in connection and make a recommendation
to the Government.

FOUR BROTHERS FROM UNITED STATES HAVE BEEN WITH THE COLORS

Among the American families who
have done their bit is one which lives
in Wisconsin. The following is a report
of what the family has done: Sgt. J.
Russell, 11th Company, Heavy Artillery,
of the American Marines, who en-
listed on June 7, 1917, did not go over-
seas, but has much experience in the
different training camps of the United
States.

Sgt. Russell put in three months at
the Fortis Island training camp at Caro-
lina, eight months at the naval ammu-
nition depot in Virginia, seven months
on recruiting duty in Cincinnati, Ohio,
and three and a half months in another
Virginia training camp.

Sgt. Russell is not the only mem-
ber of the family who is serving the
colors, as he has three brothers who
have seen service in this war. Pte.
Robert, who enlisted in the Canadian
army at Regina, and who must have
been won over by the Canadian sol-
diers, as he was only visiting relatives
in Regina when he enlisted. He is now
over in the Canadian army. Sgt. Major
Russell, another brother, enlisted in the
Canadian army, and has now seen nine months of
service overseas. Sgt. Major Russell is
with the 20th Salvage Unit.

Another brother who has seen service
is Pte. Grenville Russell, who went over-
seas one year ago last November, and
now is returning. He was a member
of the Rainbow Division. Sgt. P. J.
Russell, the marine, who was inter-
viewed yesterday, said that he had received
his discharge on February 11, 1919, and
is now visiting in the city. He expects
to return to his home at the end of the
week. He lives at 421 Washington
street, Oshawa, Ontario.
