GERMANY'S BABIES ARE MOSTLY GIRLS

LONDON, Oct. 8.—Statistics have recently been published in Germany which are so striking that the "Medical Record" (Geneva) (Switzerland) correspondent says they "need confirmation." It is stated that for every 1,000 boys born in the later years of the war, 1,086 girls have been born. Before the war the ratio was 1,000 boys to 1,024 girls.

"Nothing," writes the correspondent, "is known with certainty as to the conditions that determine sex in the human species, but there is quite a large amount of evidence in support of the generalization that during wars and famines, when the conditions are generally adverse, especially with regard to nutrition, the proportion of male relative to female births increases."

"If there is any foundation for this generalization, then we must conclude either that the figures are wrong, or that Germany was mightily well nourished during the war, or else that some entirely aberrant influence was at work."

EMBARGO LIKELY TO BE PLACED ON ALL ATLANTIC SHIPPING

More Than 30,000 Long-shoremen Are Out on Strike.

New York, Oct. 8.—Placing of an absolute embargo on New York freight boats sailing to Europe, as a possibility today as the longshoremen's strike entered its third day, apparently spreading rapidly. It was estimated that between thirty thousand and thirty-five thousand longshoremen were on strike, and that the number might grow to sixty thousand. The strikers have been joined by approximately 1,000 freight checkers employed on the piers of the large steamship companies.

The strike is now demanding \$1 an hour and \$1.50 for overtime, having refused an award of the national adjustment commission of 70 cents an hour with \$1 for overtime.

HUMAN BIRDS TO SCOUT FOR FISH

Another New Use Discovered for Airships.

New York, Oct. 8.—A new enemy the sea fishes have to fear is the human bird.

In response to a request from the United States fisheries bureau, the navy department is going to undertake to scout for schools of fish with flying machines.

Fish schools commonly travel at or near the surface of the sea, seeking what they may devour. To come across one is a big opportunity for the fishermen. If they could be located by airplanes, and information duly and promptly communicated to the fishing vessels, important results, meaning full cargoes for market, should be obtained.

Not only airplanes, but also "blimps"—small dirigible balloons—are to be utilized in this way, according to present plans. It is thought that they will prove especially valuable in the pursuit of the elusive southern mackerel.

There are two ways in which fish news gained by naval aviators may be sent to the fishermen. One is by wireless messages to fishing ports, on receipt of which fleets would immediately depart for the place indicated. Another, and probably better idea is that the airplane shall speak directly to the fishing fleet at sea by radio-telephone.

The first experiments are to be made in the neighborhood of Cape May, N. J.

PROMISES TO HELP SMASH BOLSHEVISM

Mississippi Valley Association
Leader Makes Pledge.

Chicago, Oct. 8.—In addressing a zone meeting of the Mississippi Valley association today, President Harry H. Merrick of Chicago pledged the entire power of the organization, backed by 50,000,000 population, including 25,000,000 farmers, to smash bolshevism and the soviet idea in this country.

"We are going to get the people back to the constitution of the United States, as interpreted in the light of the Ten Commandments," shouted Mr. Merrick, after telling of the great growth of the farmers' organizations in the valley.

"We are going to get away from the individualist quacks and political self-seekers and return to government by law instead of government by force in mass form."

"We are going to stand by the constitution and see to it that it is maintained by each man and every man, no matter who he is. We are going to see to it that the soviet and what it stands for is smashed so that you can't pick it up with a scoop shovel."

ZEPPELIN SERVICE FROM BERLIN TO SWEDISH CAPITAL

Stockholm, Oct. 8.—Zeppelin airship service between here and Berlin was opened today by a German airship company. The airship Bodensee left Berlin at 5 a.m. and reached here at 12.30 p.m.

The company promises a regular bi-weekly service, the fare being fixed at 40 kroner per passenger. Twenty-five passengers can be accommodated on each trip.

**SPECIAL COMMISSION
WILL EXAMINE PEACE
OFFER OF BOLSHEVSKI**

Letish Foreign Minister Likely to Urge
An Acceptance.

Copenhagen, Oct. 8.—The Letish foreign minister has issued a statement to the effect that he is going to urge the Bolshevik Government of Russia to be examined by a special commission at Riga on October 16, according to Riga advices. It is said the foreign minister will urge acceptance of the offer if the Soviet Government agrees to the armistice with Latvia, Finland, Estonia and Lithuania; recognize their importance and give assurances against propaganda and military surprise.

WANTS TERRITORY FOR BELGIUM.
Brussels, Oct. 8.—The Union of International Associations has submitted a petition to the Belgian Parliament, asking it to negotiate with the League of Nations and to offer with complete sovereignty, suitable Belgian territory having a maximum area of 7,500 acres which will become for interested governments a world federal district similar to the District of Columbia in the United States.

The union formally proposes to carry out the plan, the adding of an article to the Belgian constitution, revision of which will be undertaken soon.

GRIEF-TORN FATHER WATCHES AT SIDE OF DYING CHILD

Life of One of the Luikhart
Girls May Be Saved.

ASK FOR THEIR MOTHER
Child Laughs With Delight
Over Toy Friends Brought
to Her.

Detroit, Oct. 8.—Minute after minute, hour after hour creeping on, and life still remains in the little body of Shirley Luikhart, who, with her sister Edna, was given cholera by Dr. H. W. Yates, attending physician, for the recovery of Shirley, who now cannot speak above a whisper and refuses nourishment, but the greatly improved condition of Edna Wednesday afternoon promises some chance for the little girl, he said.

Hollow-eyed and weak from his day and night vigil at the beds of his two little daughters, who lie side by side in a ward in Providence Hospital, a grief-torn father Wednesday still persisted in his hope for the lives of the children. As Edna, bright-eyed and eager, and apparently in the best of health, sat up in bed and laughed with delight over a toy that some friends had brought, the drawn lines of the father's face relaxed into a tender smile.

"Father sees improvement," "She certainly is better, isn't she?" he said to the nurse.

The lives of the children, according to Dr. Yates, depend on how much of the poison was absorbed in their systems. If there was food in the stomach when it was given, there was some chance of recovery, he said.

There have been cases of recovery from cholera, he admitted, only under these conditions. Usually death comes from 14 to 16 days after the poison has been administered.

As Wednesday afternoon progressed, Shirley, who has been in a state hospital since the cholera attack, was brought to the hospital, and a nurse over her shoulder, complained of a sore throat and tongue, and refused to eat, although she chewed slowly on some gum her father brought to her from the drug store.

The strike to the hospital, during the afternoon, and her pulse was only slightly faster than normal. She exhibited less and less interest in things about her as the afternoon crept on, however, and seemed slightly irrational.

Ask for Mother.
During the day the children asked for their mother, but seemed satisfied when told that she could not come. Their father said that both Edna and Shirley had always cared more for their mother than for him.

"She always took such good care of them, and never let them lack a thing when it was in her power to get it for them," he said. "If they live—and I am positive Edna will, although whether Shirley will be spared only Providence can tell—they will never know that their mother tried to poison them, if I have to take them out of Detroit to hide the fact from them."

"I am certain that my wife is not responsible. In the eight years we have been married, she has done things that no national woman would do. Her mother, who now lives in Herick, S. D., has suffered from melancholia, and her grandmother was a victim of this same condition."

"Some of my friends who were here this afternoon told me that they had been to see my wife one month ago, and that they were amazed at that time to notice the change which had come over her. She seemed to be suffering from severe symptoms of melancholia, they said."

CLEMENCEAU NOT TO BE CANDIDATE

Aged French Premier To Retire From Politics.

Paris, Oct. 8.—Premier Georges Clemenceau told a delegation of former soldiers that he would not be a candidate for re-election to the Chamber of Deputies, according to M. Clemenceau's newspaper, "L'Humanite."

The probabilities of another assault upon the cabinet by the opposition has been increased by the fact that the electoral committee of the chamber in disapproving the government's plan to bring before the chamber in advance of those for the senate. It is Premier Clemenceau's intention, according to the supposition, to make this matter a question of confidence, retiring before the elections, should he be defeated.

FAVORS POLICY OF CONCILIATION.

Paris, Oct. 8.—Sir George Curzon was sent to Bucharest as allied high commissioner, with notes from the British government to the Rumanian Government, favors a policy of conciliation in dealing with that country, according to the Journal.

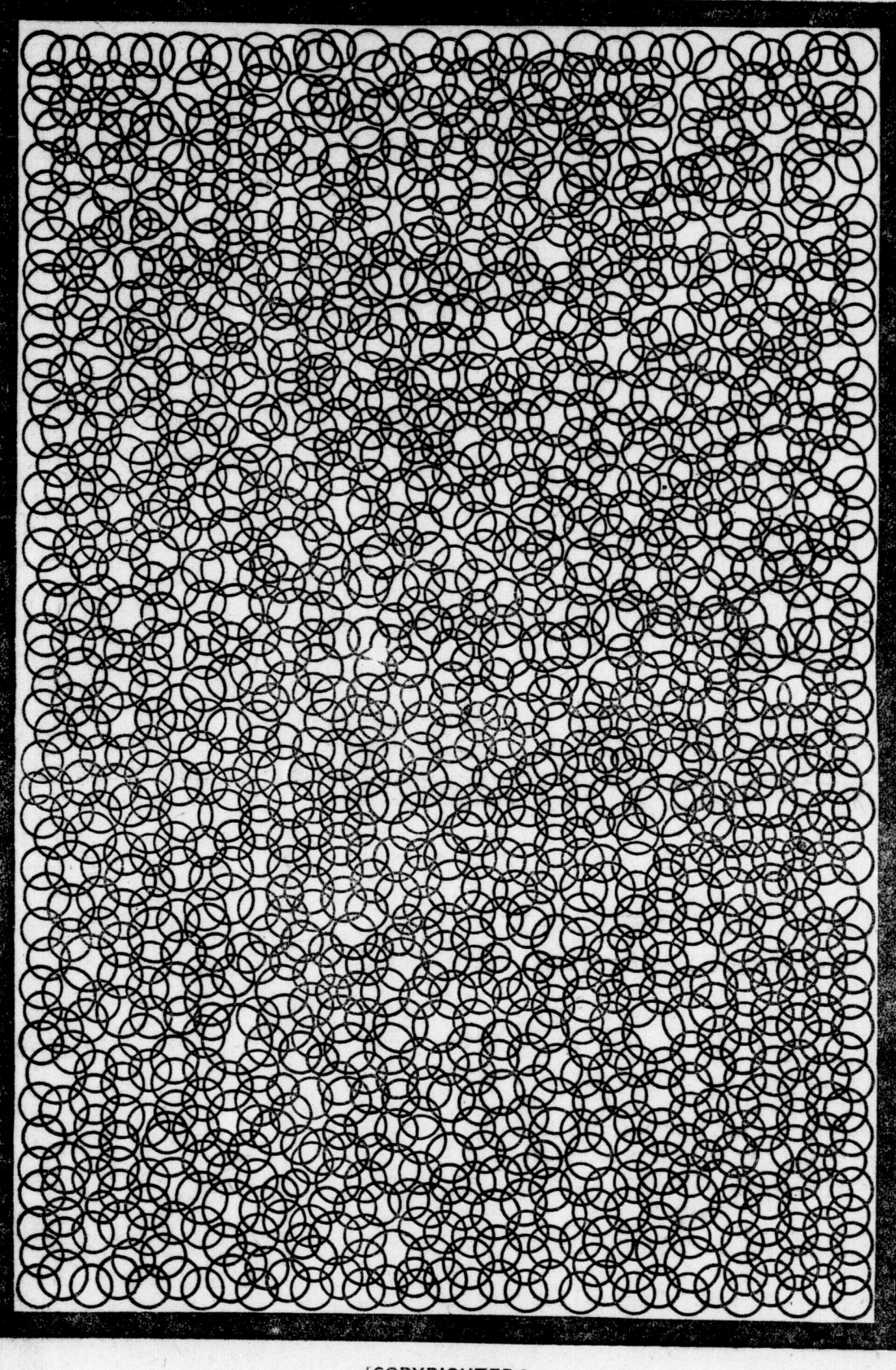
