Under circumstances somewhat rare in license matters, Daniel Miller, member of the board of license commission to-day began the signation to the provincial secretary. Rumors of dissension among the members of the board have reached the outside from time to time, but the actual facts were only disclosed to a few.

It appears that the trouble between Mr. Miller, the chairman, and Daniel Lamb, the third member, arose before the issuing of the licenses in May last (when the total number to be issued was reduced to 110). Mr. Miller says that the other members of the board broke faith with him in cutting off the license of the Brockton Club House, corner of Dundas and Sheridan-avenue, and otherwise persistent. dan-avenue, and otherwise persistently and unnecessarily penalized houses in which a philanthropic brewer of Conservative persuasion was interested.


