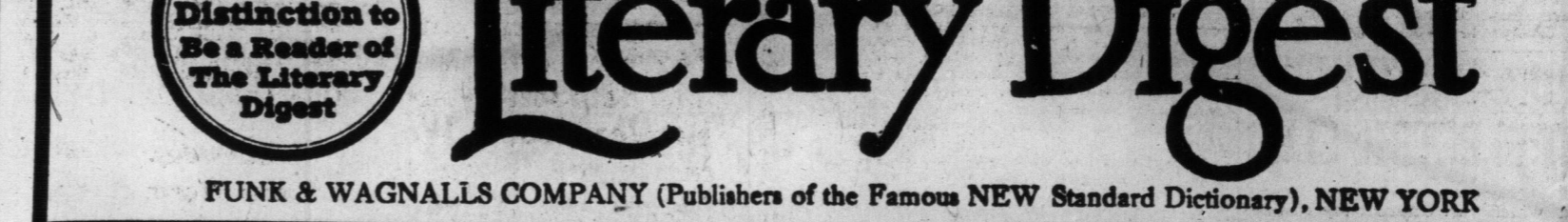

BOARD OF COMMERCE

Any legal action to be taken against the F. A. Fish Coal Co. or its proprietor as a result of the recent finding of the board of commerce will be conducted by Major Lewis Duncan, M.C., general counsel for the board, rather than J. S. Lundy of the attorney-general's department, as had been suggested. The board will hold a sitting in Toronto on Friday next to investigate the costs of building materials in this city.
