THE WEATHER

Meteorological Office, Toronto, March 31.—(8 p.m.)—The weather today has been showery in Ontario and Quebec, and mostly fair and mild in the Maritime and western provinces.

Lower Lakes and Georgian Bay—Fair; not much change in temperature.

Ottawa Valley and Upper St. Lawrence—Fair, with stationary or a little lower temperature.

Lower St. Lawrence—West to northwest clearing, with somewhat lower temperature.

Gulf and North Shore—Strong winds or moderate gales from southwest and west; unsettled, with occasional rain in east; clearing in west.

St. Lawrence—Strong winds or moderate gales, southwest, shifting to northwest; cloudy and unsettled, with occasional rain.

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FIVE POLICE DEAD FOUR TEEN MISSING

Occupants of Barracks in County Cork Made Heroic Resistance.

Cork, March 31.—An attack made this morning upon the police barracks at Rosscarbery, County Cork, resulted in serious casualties to the occupants of the barracks. Fourteen of the police are missing and it is believed five were killed.

An official report of the affair says the attack was made by civilians from the room casements to the occupants of the barracks. Fourteen of the police are missing and it is believed five were killed.

The police held the barracks until the room in which they were concentrated took fire, when a few escaped by an upper window.

The men in the barracks were driven from the room by the three hundred members of the attacking force, who used large quantities of gelignite to shatter the building. Reinforcements were rushed to the scene from Clonakilty and elsewhere, but they arrived too late to be of assistance.

S. A. SENDS MANY WOMEN TO CANADA

Commissioner Lamb States Army Will Despatch Several Thousand People.

Ottawa, March 31.—Commissioner B. C. Lamb of the Salvation Army headquarters staff, London, England, and head of the Salvation Army emigration works, was in Ottawa today.

Commissioner Lamb said he found in Canada from coast to coast, a big demand for women to work in household service, and in a short time several thousand women, selected for suitability in domestic service, would be sent to this country by the Army.

"Canada, I believe," he continued, "needs immigration. Since 1914 few have come in. For six years we were minus immigration, minus the men deported, minus the men who went to France and never returned, and a plus the pensions and plus the war debt these latter two being today a larger charge, I understand, than Canada's total pre-war income."

"What is the answer?" Canada needs more men and women of the right type."
