This he had noted alike in the home, the hotel and the re-staurant. Erormous quantities of food were carried from kitchen to table, to be toyed with more or less and then sent back uscless and de-stined to the garbage pail. For himelf he remarked he could never bring imself to send his plate away with "leavings" on it. The waste of meat struck him as particularly reprehen-sible. 
