GOVERNMENT IN REPORT

OF IEMPERANCE BODY

Series of Serious Charges Included and Report is Adopted by Large Majority

(Special to Times)

Charlottetown, P. E. I., March 12—At the annual meeting of the provincial Temperance Alliance yesterday afternoon the Mathieson administration came in for a scathing arraignment by the executive in the latter's report. The government was charged with broken promises, laxity in enforcing the law, protecting notorious violators, interfering with the cause of justice to save political favorites and continually blocking the efforts of the alliance.

It was declared that in Summerside there were only four convictions in eleven months notwithstanding a marked increase in the number of cases of drunk. enness, and that in Charlottefown the number of convictions for drunkenness had increased from ninety-four in 1905 to 226 in 1914. The Conservatives, expecting that the government would be warmly attacked, sent friends, including special pleaders, to the meeting. The chief spokesman was Hon. Murdock McKinnon, commissioner of agriculture. The friends of the administration were greatly outnumbered and the report of the executive was adopted by an overwhelming majority, many Conservatives voting for it.


