

Extra Fancy Pumpkin Pie

11-2 cups cooked strained pumpkin 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon ginger, 1-2 teaspoon salt. 2 eggs, 11-2 cups milk,

1-2 cup cream. To pumpkin add sugar, spices and salt, then the well-beaten eggs and lastly the milk and cream mixed. Line individual pie tins with a rich crust and bake in a moderate oven (850 degrees) until set. Cover with sweetened whipped cream.
