LOS ANGELES, Jan. 6-One hundred and thirty swimmers, including Shler Mendelson and George Young, of Toronto, Ont., have entered for William Wrigley's \$40,000 marathon channel swim. at the end of which lies a "pot of gold," and glory for the first to officially swim the tur-bulent and icy passage lying between Santa Catalina Island and the Cali-

fornia mainland. This was revealed in the official en-try list which closed at midnight and was announced early today by officials in charge of the forthcoming event.

The event is set for January 15.


