

# STATE OWNED PITS PRIVATELY WORKED, URGED

Miners' Plea For Nationalization Is Rejected

LEADERS SPEAK  
Sees No Solution of Present Difficulty; Collapse of Industry Predicted

LONDON, March 11.—Momentous industrial results, and perhaps equally momentous political ones, are everywhere recognized as depending on the report of the Royal Coal Commission which was made public last night. The commission was appointed some time ago to arrange a plan to put the coal industry on a sound basis, and eliminate disputes between miners and mine owners.


The report recommended state ownership of mines, but development under private enterprise, supervised by the government. The recommendation of the miners' federation for nationalization, in which the country was most vitally interested, was acted upon adversely.

The report, which was drawn up by Sir Herbert Samuel, Sir William Beveridge, General Sir Herbert Lawrence and Kenneth Lee, all prominent in British industrial life, was unanimous.

REPORT DENOUNCED.  
Neither the mine owners nor the miners have as yet made an official declaration of opinion but the comments by industrialists and the newspapers make clear that the report will do nothing to harmonize the conflicting interests. Labor leaders who have expressed opinions on the report roundly denounced it.

PREDICTS COLLAPSE.  
Frank Hodges, secretary of the International Miners Federation, declared the coal industry would collapse May 1, if a recommendation by the committee to withdraw the subsidy the government is paying the miners and mine owners is adopted.

The Times says the first move rests with the government, and it advises the government to accept the report as a whole and get to work on its recommendations.

ELECTION VISIONED  
When the question of the government's adoption and giving effect to the report was discussed in the lobby of the House of Commons last night, there were some members who predicted that if it did so, the country soon would be involved in a general election.

One of the main clauses of the report says that depression in coal industry could not be attributed to political unrest or restriction of output by the miners or inefficiency of management. It adds that the commission disapproved with the view of the mine owners that the only practicable remedy was to reduce wages, lengthen hours of work and decrease railway rates by lowering wages of the railway men. The way to prosperity lay in three chief lines—greater application of science to mining and the use of coal, larger units for production and distribution and fuller partnership between employees and employers.

## SCORES FAILURE OF U. S. TO JOIN LEAGUE

Dr. Rice, New York, Declares  
Attitude is Great  
"Calamity"

TORONTO, Ont., March 11.—Dr. K. P. Rice, of New York, speaking before the Religious Education Association at the Metropolitan Church here last night on "The pressure of economic elements in world affairs," stated that one of the greatest calamities of the present age was the failure of the United States to become a member of the League of Nations. The United States was contributing toward the downfall of civilization, he declared, by declining to catch the spirit of the league and play its part toward its furtherance.

"If the United States is to make its proper contribution towards world peace, then it must join hands with the other nations and work towards that end through such instruments as are being built up by the League of Nations," Dr. Rice stated.

The reason the United States had not yet joined was to be found in the belief in that country that each nation still retains the right to self-determination, but, "in a new world such as we are facing today, no nation has that right," he said.

## KOVNO IS FLOODED

Lithuania River Rises 23 Feet—  
Heavy Damage Is  
Reported

KOVNO, Lithuania, March 11.—Floods of unprecedented proportions are threatening Kovno, which lies at the junction of the Niemen and Vilnya rivers.

The Niemen already has risen 23 feet and more than 800 houses in the lower part of the city have been flooded. The damage done by the water thus far is estimated at several millions of liras.

## Expect Many On Chicago Pilgrimage

LONDON, March 11.—A despatch to the Westminster Gazette from Cairo, says it is reported that the Egyptian antiquities department intends to place the mummy of Tutankhamen in a plain iron casket which will be put in one of the smaller chambers of his tomb, and that the chamber will then be sealed.

LONDON, England, March 11.—William Marconi, having entered a London hospital last week end, suffering from overwork and nervousness, underwent a minor operation yesterday for an internal disorder.

At first it was feared that the inventor of wireless telegraphy was suffering from appendicitis, but was found not to be the case.

A bulletin stated that he was making satisfactory progress and early recovery is expected if no complications develop. As soon as he is able to travel, Signor Marconi expects to board his yacht at Naples for a cruise.

## LARGE SUM SPENT ON BEAUTY IN U. S.

60,000,000 Customers Spent  
\$390,000,000 to Improve  
Feminine Charms in 1925

NEW YORK, March 11.—Sixty million women and children in the United States patronized beauty parlors last year, each spending approximately six and a half dollars, or \$390,000,000 in all, according to Charles Nesler, president of the Master Hairdressers' Association of America, at a convention in the Hotel Commodore.

Hairdressers and proprietors of beauty shops came to the meeting from all parts of the country, from Canada, New Zealand and Europe. They represented more than 170,000 men and women in the industry.

"The manufacture of beauty is a combination of science and art," said Mr. Nesler. "Eleven states have laws regulating the activities of beauty parlors, and issuing licenses to operators. There are state examinations, which require a varied scientific information including first aid, chemistry, anatomy of the face, head and hands, and technical knowledge of the handling of electrical apparatus."

"There are 138 training schools for future creators of feminine beauty in this country. Several years ago beauty parlor had to pay students during their apprenticeship. Today pupils pay an average of \$200 for instruction. One school turns out 2,000 graduates each year."

The most question of the bob was taken up at the convention, and there appeared to be about an equal number of advocates and opponents.
