MAN KILLED AND DAMAGE HEAVY IN D.C. STORM

**Chimneys Topple Over
With Roofs Lifted
Completely**

SERVICES ARE CUT

**Pine View Farmer Meets Death
When Pinned Beneath
Falling Tree**

PRINCE GEORGE, B. C., May 21.—One death and heavy damage resulted from a severe storm which swept this section of Northern Central British Columbia, adjacent to the headwaters of the Fraser River, Wednesday afternoon.

The storm assumed the proportions of a tornado for twenty minutes in Prince George. Nels Nelson, pioneer farmer of the Pine View district, was almost instantly killed when pinned beneath a falling tree.

TELEPHONE DOWN

Telegraph communication between the outside world and Prince Rupert, on the northern British Columbia coast, was disrupted until yesterday, when wires were blown down. Telephone service was completely disrupted and in a few instances chimneys toppled over, roofs were completely lifted from the houses and windows were shattered.

TREATY SIGNED

AMSTERDAM, May 21.—The Department of Foreign Affairs announces that a treaty of arbitration and conciliation between Holland and Germany, was formerly signed yesterday at The Hague.

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
