## THE WEST INDIES

### TRADE IMPROVING, SAYSE H. S. FLOOD

Business conditions in the West Indies are improving, according to E. H. Sayse, Canadian trade commissioner for the islands, in an interview yesterday in which he also expressed the hope that the West Indies would result from the visit there last spring of the delegation of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, headed by W. Shivers Fisher, of St. John. Mr. Flood, who is a native of St. John and is very well known in the city, arrived from Barbados on the R. M. S. P. Chaleur, accompanied by Mrs. Flood. The trade commissioner expects to go to Ottawa shortly and then return to the West Indies some time in September. He was very optimistic in regard to the market outlook for the islands.

THE TREND OF PRICES.  
(Bank of Commerce Circular.)  
Our index numbers of the wholesale prices both of exports and of imports have risen: that of exports from 152.25 to 154.23, that of imports from 154.02 to 161.68. Wheat prices have fluctuated during the month but the general trend has been towards a firmer figure. Cattle and beef have declined in price, but hogs and bacon have risen. The prices of wool, hides and pine have also risen. Among the imports which have increased in price are corn, sugar, raw cotton, rubber, linseed oil, coal, pig iron, tin, coke and coal.

There is a feeling in both Canada and the United States that a major upward swing of prices has set in, although it is quite possible that, as has happened after nearly all great wars, the general trend of prices over the next quarter of a century will be towards a lower rather than a higher level. The ideal condition is that prices shall be constant; in other words, that there shall be a nice balance between supply and demand. Falling this, it is eminently desirable that any reactions that may follow extravagant consumption or over-production shall manifest themselves respectively as periods of gradually falling or rising prices. Until the recent labour trouble in the United States, the difficulty lay in interesting the consumer; it now appears to be in interesting the producer. Consumption is certainly on the mend, but the moment it feels, in rising prices, the effect of under-production of basic materials, such as iron and coal, it will be sure to decrease.

## CANNING BLUEBERRIES.

Chatham World—Canning operations will be in full swing about the last of this week. The blueberry crop is expected to be above the average.

## TRADE IN DAIRY PRODUCTS.

(Bank of Commerce Circular.)  
The amount of butter produced in Canada during 1921 was considerably larger than the year before, but there was a sharp decline in the amount exported. During the present season, however, there has been a decided improvement, shipments from Montreal up to 15th July totalling 105,206 packages, as compared with 105,882 during the corresponding period last year. This improvement must have come as the result of a sudden change, for the Canadian trade commission in the United Kingdom reports that the receipts of Canadian butter in the United Kingdom during the first five months of the current year amounted to only 170 cwt. out of total imports of 2,076,195 cwt.

In the case of cheese, the trade in which with Great Britain has been on time virtually a Canadian monopoly, Canada supplied during the same five months 94,248 cwt. out of a total of 1,068,797 cwt. imported from all countries, while the distant dominion of New Zealand contributed 89,201 cwt. Even when due allowance is made for the season, the falling-off is one which ought to be noted by those interested in the development of the dairy industry.

A meeting of the board of directors of the Protestant Orphan's Home was held yesterday afternoon at the West St. John institution with Dr. James Manning presiding. Plans for the coming year were discussed. Reports of the management of the homes in Britain, Ireland, and West St. John were received and found satisfactory.
