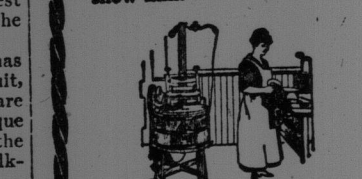

yesterday on the pier when she landed
from the White Star liner Olympic by
the splendor of her costume and the
brilliance of her jewels. The dancer,
an attractive fair-haired girl of 21 years,
wore a broadtail full coat worth at
least \$3,000 and a necklace of gray
squirrel round her shoulders.

The customs officials took an interest
in her and to their surprise discov-
ered that the dazzling jewels and the
costly garments had not been declared
by the fair dancer. Miss Hughes, who
had been abroad a little more than ten
months, had declared herself a resident
of the United States and said she had
come back to spend Thanksgiving with
her mother, Mrs. Thomas Hughes, at
Flushing, and intended to return to
France on Dec. 2.

A brief examination of her baggage
satisfied the customs officials and the
appraisers that there were jewels,
gowns and coats worth between \$5,000
and \$10,000 liable to duty. The
trunks were ordered sent to the public
stores and the articles will be exam-
ined and appraised at 2 o'clock tomorrow
afternoon.

Miss Hughes, who had a companion
on the voyage, Miss J. Rechtenstein, did
not appear disturbed when she was in-
formed that her baggage would be de-
tained and that she would have to go to
the Custom House and be questioned by
the Law Department as to why certain
articles she had brought in had not been
declared.

Friends on the Olympic had advised
the dancer to have her jewels and costly
wraps and gowns bonded until she went
away on the France but she wanted to
wear them during her visit to New
York, she said.

Officials of the Custom House declined
to discuss the case but said it would
be fully entered into on Friday after-
noon. They intimated that the value of
the dutiable goods might reach \$100,000
and that there might be some interest-
ing developments when the particulars
became known.

After going to the Custom House, ac-
companied by a lawyer, Miss Hughes
went to Flushing, it was said, to spend
her Thanksgiving with the hand bag-
gage the Customs officials permitted her
to take.

Miss Hughes said that Maurice, her
partner had been taken ill and had gone
to a nursing home in London but that
she hoped he would be well enough to
dance with her in Paris before the New
Year.

SAYS STORES LURE THIEVES

Court, in Sentencing Six Shoplifters,
Urges Preventive Measures.

"My experience on the bench has
shown that seven out of every ten shop-
lifters are tempted by the display of ar-
ticles, apparently unprotected," declared
Justice Freschi in the New York special
sessions when four women and two men
were found guilty of shoplifting in de-

partment stores. Three of the women
were sentenced to one day each in the
Tomb and fined, while the fourth was
fined only.

Justice Herbert, who presided, and
Justice Healy concurred in Justice
Freschi's remarks, asserting that store
proprietors should seek to prevent shop-
lifting rather than confine their efforts to
the arrest and prosecution of offenders.
