


An Historic Building

St. John Presbyterian Church, Soon to Become House of Y. W. C. A., Has Played Interesting Part in Religious Life of the City.



THE OLD ST. JOHN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, which has served four religious denominations and soon will be the headquarters for Y. W. C. A. work.

The transfer of the former St. John Presbyterian church property to St. John to the Young Women's Christian Association of the city seems to inspire the pen of the historian to reminiscences which in an interesting way relate the present with the past. The building was originally known as the Second Baptist church, and was dedicated to the worship of God on July 10, 1840, Rev. E. A. Cawley being the preacher on that occasion. When Saint John Presbyterian church—as first styled “The First Free Presbyterian Church of St. John”—was formed by secession from St. Andrew's church in 1843, the Second Baptist church was purchased as their house of worship. Pending the arrival of a minister of their own, the church was placed at the disposal of the Congregationalists of the city, then enjoying the services of their first minister, Rev. C. Galloway, who worshipped here from November 12 until the end of the year. Mr. Galloway had been sent out by the Congregational Union of England and Wales on application of residents of St. John who desired to organize a Congregational church, and preached his first sermon in this church, October 8, 1843, while it was still the Second Baptist church. The Congregational body took steps to secure this church for their own permanent home, but when they approached the owners it had been already promised to the Presbyterians. There is no record to show how many days—or, it may be, hours—stood between this historic building being the Congregational church of the city instead of, as it actually became, St. John Presbyterian church.

Rev. Robert Irvine, formerly of Ballymash, Ireland, was the first minister of the newly formed Presbyterian congregation. He arrived in St. John on May 7, 1844, on the “Lady Sale,” then owned by Messrs. William Parks and John Hegan. He preached his first sermon in the newly purchased church on the following Sunday, May 12. Probably the only person living today who was present at that service is Mrs. George McFarlane, now resident at New Brunswick. During Mr. Irvine's ministry the church was enlarged to its present dimensions with galleries on three sides, elevated choir and high pulpit after the fashion of the Old Land. During the ministry of Dr. Fotheringham, the church underwent a thorough renovation. The galleries were removed, the old pulpit was superseded by the new, the pointed Gothic arch of the windows gave way to the rectangular Eastlake design. The church continued to be the home of the congregation throughout the pastorate of Rev. Dr. Irvine, the temporary appointment as stated supply of Rev. William Elder, the pastorate of Revs. Dr. James Bennett, Dr. T. Fotheringham and J. H. A. Anderson until the inauguration of the congregation with the St. Stephen's church to form the present Knox church.

In the earlier days a week day school was conducted in the basement and there are still living in St. John and elsewhere those who gained no small part of their education in this school. In the “great fire” of 1877, St. John Presbyterian church marked the northernly point at which after strenuous efforts, the destroying flames were stayed. Since December, 1917, it has been the temporary home of St. David's congregation, whose people are about to enter upon a new stage in their church history, their own new church building risen in dignified grandeur from the

is built upon the foundation laid by the third pastor of St. John Presbyterian church.

These names with that of Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, now minister of St. John's church, Chatham, contribute to the roll of ministers throughout the seventy-three years of the independent history of St. John Presbyterian church. The church edifice, which during the nearly four hundred years has had its points of contact, permanent and transient with a Baptist church, a Congregational church and two Presbyterian churches now becomes the home of the Y. W. C. A., closing its history as a church building, but perpetuating a history of which the Y. W. C. A. is a fitting outcome.

GOVERNMENT SELLING SUPPLIES TO SOLDIERS



WOMEN'S CONGRESS ENDS

Washington, Nov. 7.—The international congress of working women which has been in session here for ten days, brought its sessions to a close last night with a dinner at which the principal speakers were the newly elected officers, and at which a resolution favoring the regulation and protection of emigration was adopted unanimously. A resolution also was adopted as a protest by the working women of the world against the blockade of the great part of Russia on the grounds that this blockade is directed against millions of women and children and has brought in its train starvation, disease and death. The resolution, though none of the Allied powers are officially at war with Russia.

YOUTH HOLDS UP CHINESE CAFE

Bellevue, Nov. 6.—A daring hold-up occurred yesterday at the Royal Cafe of this city, conducted by J. S. Toms, a Chinaman. The restaurant was closed, but two men gained an entrance to the rear and held the point of a revolver, four young Chinese waiters, securing about \$20, an overcoat and a quantity of cigarettes. An attempt to rob the cash register, which was locked, failed. One of the parties cut the telephone wires with a knife.

Later a young man was arrested at the C. N. R. station as he was purchasing two tickets for Toronto. He gave his name as Simpson, of 313 Church street, Toronto. He wore a belt about the waist which contained twenty-five rounds of .38-calibre revolver cartridges, also the disk used to cut the wire. His companion escaped.

Later Simpson, before Magistrate Mason, pleaded guilty to highway robbery and was remanded to jail for a week for sentence. He gave the name of his companion as Brown, residing on Jarvis street, Toronto, and stated both of them had worked at Christie & Brown's suit works. Simpson is only sixteen years of age. The money and articles taken were recovered.

LONG BURIED IN ICE

Explorer Finds Bodies of Eighty Stone Age Eskimos.

Nome, Alaska, Nov. 7.—Discovery of a buried Eskimo village, together with the frozen bodies of eighty of its ancient inhabitants was made recently by W. B. Van Vliet, of the University of Pennsylvania, who has been here on his way to the United States. He has been in the Barrow country for nearly two years, gathering relics of what is termed the “Stone Age” of the natives of Far Northern Alaska. Bodies of several of the prehistoric Eskimos, which Van Vliet said, differed in the shape of the head and in other particulars from present-day Eskimos, have been shipped to the Museum of the University of Pennsylvania.

SENSE OF LOCATION STRONG IN ANIMALS

Wasps Fly Many Miles to Nest After Enforced Absence

Under The Arctic Ice; Striped Seal Finds Her Way Home in Total Darkness

For a long time naturalists have been experimenting with various forms of animal life with a view to determining whether such animals possess a sense that enables them to seek out desired places, even when they have been transported a great distance therefrom. Among the first to experiment in this way was the French naturalist, Fabre, whose investigations concerned chiefly the wasp family, says the writer of an article in the Christian Science Monitor.

Fabre painted the abdomen of each of a dozen wasps with white pigment, thrusting each into a small paper cylinder, and then deposited all the cylinders thus filled in a tightly closed box that was carried over two miles from the place where the nests of the wasps were found. When the wasps were liberated they flew off in various directions. Fabre returned to the nest about five hours after the liberation to observe the wasps that were coming and going. He soon found four wasps whose abdomens were painted with the white pigment; and it was not long before the others so adorned arrived.

It was contended, from those experiments, that the evidence showed that the wasps could not have found their nests either by sense of smell or by that of sight; and it was therefore maintained that they were possessed of a sense, called by some the “sense of location” or “orientation.” Further experiments were of still greater interest. Nine wasps were caught, painted white, and taken to the center of a city, some four miles distant from their nest. The wasps at once flew up above the roofs of the city, and immediately took a southern course toward their nest. The next day five of these wasps were found in the nest.

The “Parasite Wasp.” Another member of the wasp family that appears to possess the sense referred to is the “parasite wasp,” that one which lays its eggs in the cells of the “mason bees,” whose nests are completed by the mason bee of its cells, eggs are deposited in it, and food is placed by the mason bee. The next day five of these wasps were found in the nest.

Now, about the time the egg has hatched into the larva, comes the parasite wasp. It stalks over the wall with its sensitive feelers daintily sounding the cell under clay. The clay, in the moment that it reaches the spot where the cell lies, the wasp begins to bore, this task consuming a number of hours. Eventually the wasp has succeeded in sinking a shaft straight and true to the concealed egg. The wasp then lays her eggs in it. Thus when her young are hatched, they are enabled to have a nice little feast.

Try Under Ice. To consider the case of other than insects in this connection, attention may be called to the actions of the striped seal, that builds her house many miles from the open sea, in most cases, at least a mile and a half or two miles under water. Naturalists after the striped seal swims away from her dwelling every morning to go to an open sea; that she has absolutely no guide save her return voyage; that there is entire darkness in the water under the ice; that the appearance everywhere; but that nevertheless, the seal finds her home every night as surely as if her road way was brightly illuminated as a city street.

COLLEENS WARNED NOT TO MINGLE WITH TOMMIES

Dublin, Nov. 6.—Love making by the girls of Ireland with members of the British government forces has been prescribed by the Irish republicans. Any girl found with a government soldier or policeman will be penalized by having her hair cut off. One girl has already suffered the full penalty, losing her locks for walking out with a soldier.

A proclamation has been posted, signed by “The competent military authority,” saying:— “Whereas certain girls, wanting in self-respect have damaged themselves by keeping company with the army of occupation, it is deemed proper by competent authority both to safeguard morality and to stop the furtherance of these culprits and also to warn them that after the publication of this proclamation those who persist in the above mentioned scandalous, unpatriotic company-keeping render themselves liable to the punishment of being branded by having the hair cut off. The names of four offenders, are attached to the proclamation.
