KILL THE BOLSHEVICS BY USE OF PUBLICITY

This is the Plan Peter Wright
Would Use to Overcome Them
—Due to Ignorance

(Toronto Star).
"Freedom is the first and absolutely most imperative factor of reconstruction," said Councillor Peter Wright, trustee and representative of the British Seamen's and Firemen's Union, who is watching events in Canada during his visit very closely, and expresses doubts if the best means are being taken to combat the necessary evils which follow in the wake of the world war.

"They are all talking on this new problem and this is a period for acting, not talking. Our men at the front and at sea were successful in the greatest enterprise in history. It was done by acting and thinking and not at all by talking," he said. "While the leaders in the army and navy have done their duties, it is up to the governing authorities to awaken and to prepare their plans on the most modern and scientific lines existing."

"It is agreed among all thinkers that freedom has been the greatest means of purifying society and it is also agreed that a repression of freedom has always, as history will show, encouraged hideous and contaminating influences that could never thrive where freedom existed."

"Bolshevism really means syndicalism and anarchy. The term is both misunderstood and misapplied. Syndicalism in the sense that those who profess it creed state frankly that capitalism must be destroyed. They hope to do this by making it impossible for capital to have any share in production by the continuing agitation for shorter hours and higher pay until the workers take over the production at the expense of the world's large and society. In other words this means every man and section and trade

"high wages," "no work," "thrift" and "no taxation." I think it is a mistake to allow false opinions to arise in regard to this danger. Better far combat the evil by free, unrestricted debate. I am willing to meet any man on any platform in debate who thinks that he can uphold Bolshevistic teachings, and before a jury of the people of Toronto or any other city in Canada will undertake to lay the ghost and prove that the whole scheme of life is impossible and that it must be cast out if the civilization of the world is to remain and the world be safe for democracy."

What Happened in England.
A practical working illustration of the way the Bolsheviks interrupt the progress and advance of labor was related by Mr. Wright in regard to the railway situation in England last summer. Troubles had arisen among the railway employees, who were the worst-paid employees in the country. A meeting was held in London between representatives of the men and the officers of the companies and a settlement after debate was arrived at, which appeared to be fair to the men and which the executives.

"Then what happened?" said Mr. Wright. "The new schedules went into effect everywhere except in one or two places where the Bolsheviks had control and they refused to accept and went on strike. Themselves first and last, and everyone else nowhere. The rest of the country was satisfied, and they set themselves apart and thought they had a chance to enforce demands at variance with the rest of their order. Their representative himself threw up his hands in disgust and declined to represent them on any board."

"The Bolshevism is not such a disease as a symptom of a disease and to fight him we must remove the causes which created him. The disease is industrial

unrest, and that is the sign of the times. The existing attitude of capital and labor toward each other is too largely one of distrust born of fear, which was the feeling of the nations of Europe before the war. If industry is to serve humanity this attitude must be changed to one of trust, inspired by faith."

"An industrial system characterized by antagonisms, coercion and resistance must yield to a new order of things based on mutual confidence, faith, justice and constructive goodwill," he concluded. "The change will involve patience, but nothing short of it will solve the problems of humanity."

A WESTERN VIEW.

Saskatoon Star: We must have revenue, that is perfectly well understood. Canada has assumed a great war burden and must carry it in the future, and with it the necessary expenditures for expansion and development. But no one who is not a beneficiary of the protective tariff will argue that it must be maintained at its present level to produce the revenue that is needed. More revenue, undoubtedly, can be obtained by reducing it in the majority of cases, and there are other sources of revenue which are certainly not being worked to advantage. The income tax, for instance, a form of direct taxation adopted with the approval of practically the whole country, should be producing two or three times as much as it is. We have only to look at the position of this tax in our own province, where practically none at all has been collected, to understand this. And the income tax is universally heralded as the most equitable and satisfactory method of direct taxation in vogue anywhere.


