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**GRAND FALLS PLANS ALMOST COMPLETED**

Alternative Projects, Both With Advantages, But Million Difference in Cost

The construction of the immense pulp and paper mills at Grand Falls is rapidly approaching completion. For several years the project has been delayed owing to the conflict of interests between two rival companies, but this was straightened out some time ago when the company in which Sir William Van Home is interested took over the rights of the other company. Since then steady progress has been made with the plans, and it is understood that they are now ready to be submitted to the directors of the company.

It is said that the engineers will present alternative plans for bringing the water power to the turbines, which will convert it into electricity. One plan calls for the excavation of a tunnel through the solid rock twenty-five feet in diameter and nearly 1,000 yards in length. The other plan is for a canal of almost equal length. Both plans have their advantages, but there is a difference of almost a million dollars in the cost.

As soon as the board of directors decide which plan to adopt, it is believed the work of construction will be commenced.

**CANADA AND THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND**

London, Jan. 22.—The archbishops of Canterbury and York, and the Bishop of London spoke on behalf of western Canada in the church in Westminster last night.

The day will come, declared the Archbishop of Canterbury, "when help will be sent to England in time of spiritual need from those prolific provinces, but at this moment the call is to us."

The Bishop of London, speaking of Canada's loyalty, exclaimed: "Don't let us tamper with it, it is a great asset. His lordship admitted that Anglicans had shown less fervor regarding Canada than other denominations. We ought to give all heart to Protestants, who have already done such wonderful work there."

The bishop spoke enthusiastically of the absence of denominational feeling in Canada.

Canon Stuart, who recently visited Canada, had almost been inclined to think the name of the Church of England was unfortunate and ought to be changed to that of Canada. "The immense loyalty to the king, but there's more loyalty to Canada. Every little child thinks it is going to become the job of the future."

Two young boys were arraigned in the juvenile court this morning on the charge of stealing iron from Hilyard's pond in Hilyard street. They pleaded guilty, but said they thought the iron was no good. After being given a good lecturing, they were allowed to go on suspended sentence.

**C. P. R. DOCTOR AND ENGINEER KILLED**

Collision in Maine — Damage to Rolling Stock Slight

Two men were killed in a recent collision of trains on the C. P. R. at Onawa station, Maine, last night. Dr. Daniel W. Hayes and Frederick Randall, both of Brownville, were killed. Mr. Randall was the engineer of a freight which ran into the passenger train. Doctor Hayes was in the employ of the railroad as a doctor.

Superintendent Dowle received word this morning that the damage done to the rolling stock in the collision was very slight. Mr. Dowle expressed great regret on account of the death of Dr. Hayes and Engineer Randall. Dr. Hayes was about forty years of age and had been the C. P. R. physician at Brownville Junction for several years. He was survived by his wife and quite a large family. He was very popular in that section of the country and his death will be regretted by all who knew him. Engineer Randall had been on the road for ten or twelve years. His father is also employed on the road.

**EIGHTY DOLLARS OR A YEAR IN JAIL**

Eighty dollars or twelve months in jail was the fine imposed on William Cook in the police court this morning. Cook was charged with being drunk, resisting the police and with using profane and obscene language. The arrest was made by Policeman Watkinson and Briggs. Cook denied the charges, but on the strength of the evidence given by Policeman Watkinson, he was fined \$8 or two months in jail for the profanity and 864 or eight months in jail for resisting the police. Two prisoners charged with drunkenness were remanded.
