FORMER NORTH END MAN LOSES LIFE IN ONTARIO FIRE

Henry Brookings Suffocated in Shaft of Mine—Wife on Way Home From Hospital When She Learned Sad News

News reached the city yesterday that Henry Brookings, a former resident of North End, had lost his life in a recent fire in Ontario, and that his body had been laid to rest in Forest Hills Cemetery, Boston, where he had been buried for some time. He had gone to Ontario to work at mining and he was suffocated in the shaft of a newly-opened mine when a fire broke out.

Mr. Brookings was twenty-eight years of age, and a few years ago lived in the North End, where his friends will regret to learn of his death. He was twice married. His second wife, being living with him in the mining town in Ontario up to within a few weeks of the time of his death when a severe illness compelled her to go to Toronto to a hospital for treatment. Under proper care she recovered and was returning to her husband and her home, when she learned the sad news of his death. Besides his wife, he is survived by his mother, brother and sister, all living in Boston.

PLEASED WITH SITE FOR FINE NEW POST OFFICE BUILDING

No Better Location Could Be Chosen is Comment Heard in The Streets Today

The selection of the site for the new post office in Prince William street on the lot on which the Bayard Building stands and the vacant lot adjoining met with general approval under discussion this morning by men in the streets. It was felt that no better location could be desired.

The office holders in the building are as follows: the Robert Riddell Co., White & Calkin, Knowlton & Gilchrist, Great West Life, and T. T. Lantalam. The building is owned by Miss Sophia Bayard, who is at present in Digby.

A handsome large post office, after the style of the new one in Winnipeg is to be built.

IN THE COURTS

Judge Forbes Comments on Case of Titus vs. Menzies—The Absent Sprague Again Called in Vain.

The appeal in the case of George D. Titus vs. Menzies was heard before Judge Forbes in Chambers this morning. Three witnesses were examined and gave substantially the same evidence as given in the police court.

His Honor said it was ridiculous to take the time of the court with such a trifling case.

Mr. Titus, who is the assistant clerk of the King vs. Sprague, had the prisoner, Menzies, on King street, for some pastry sandwiches. While there he and Mr. Menzies had an altercation, which resulted in Mr. Titus being assisted out. He instituted proceedings against Mr. Menzies for assault.

Judge Ritchie dismissed the case on the ground that, while a technical assault had been committed, it was not trifling for the consideration of the court. From His Honor's decision Mr. Titus appealed. The case was adjourned until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock in order to secure another witness for the plaintiff, Daniel Mullin, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and G. E. Logan for the defendant.

A. A. Wilson, K. C., in the case of the King vs. Sprague, had the prisoner called this morning, and on the ball not producing him, moved that the ball be arrested.

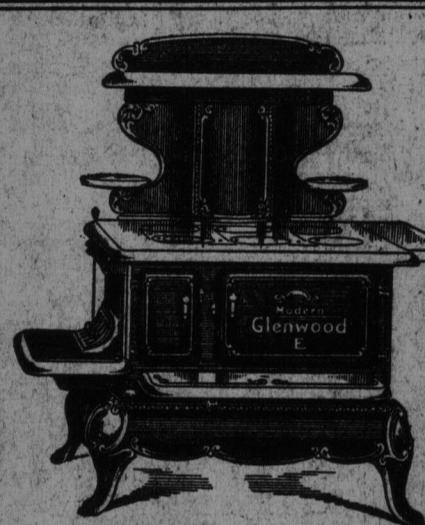
