The Bramo Somaj.
A new sect or church has recently appeared in India whose doctrines are exciting considerable notice in the Christian world. The New York Independent says of this new movement—"The Bramo Somaj is essentially Christian though it does not call itself so. It recognizes Christ as a prophet; it glorifies him; it makes large use of the Christian Scriptures. It is not fixed faith. But whatever its future may be, it is now among the great forces which are gradually working reformation in the social and religious character of India. As long as it remains true to its mission it should receive Christian sympathy and support."
