EARL GREY WILL SPEAK AT
THE PEACE CONFERENCE

NEW YORK, March 12.—Earl Grey, Governor General of Canada, has accepted an invitation to deliver an address at the public dinner April 17, which is to close the National Peace Congress. Other speakers will be President Roosevelt, President Comper, Baron D'Estournelles de Constant, of France; W. T. Stead, the English editor; and Sir Robert Cranston, Lord Provost of Edinburgh.

BERLIN, March 12.—The Rhenish Westfälische Zeitung of Essen says the navy department intends to acquire the entire table land of the island of Helgoland and will build a strong fortress there.

TO PLAY "HAMLET" IS AMBITION OF GIRL

LONDON, March 2.—Miss Gwendolen Lalor, who recently gave a successful Shakespearean recital at Brinsford Hall, and astonished her audience by appearing as Hamlet, is a young actress with one great ambition.

She will only be happy when she appears, not on the platform, but on the stage as the melancholy Prince of Denmark.

In a city office yesterday Miss Lalor, attired in black velvet doublet and silk hose, declaimed the great scene between Hamlet and his mother.

She spoke the Queen's lines in a rich contralto voice, but when she became Hamlet the voice was so deep and resonant as to be almost uncanny.

"I shall play Hamlet because I feel I must," she said yesterday, "and because I believe I can. I shall not be happy until I do so."

Mr. Benson has promised me a strong part in his company, and I am looking forward to it immensely, but, above all things, I wish to play Hamlet. Mr. Benson is the only Hamlet I have ever seen."

FORECAST OF THE NEW MANITOBA CABINET

WINNIPEG, March 12.—Nothing definite regarding the provincial cabinet can be learned but it is an assured fact that Mr. Armstrong will secure a portfolio. If Mr. Campbell is defeated on a re-count, either Messrs. Agnew or Hoaden, most probably the latter, will be attorney general, as Mr. Agnew prefers to remain in the treasury department. Mr. McInnes (Brandon) is slated for the speakership.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP OF UNDERTAKING BUSINESS

VIENNA, March 12.—The newest form of municipal trading which the city of Vienna intends to enter on is the undertaking's business. Dr. Laueger expressed himself in favor of the municipalization of all that belongs to burial on the ground that the best the municipality could do for a citizen who paid rates all his life was to see that he was well buried.

Arrangements have been made by the municipality to take over the business and stock-in-trade of the largest undertakers in Vienna and the civic authorities claim that the cost of municipal funerals will be less than the undertakers charged, while they hope that a profit will be realized which will go to the credit of the rates.

NEWSPAPER VOTERS

FREE HARRY THAW

Of 16,763 Opinions. Only 4,266 Are for Conviction

DENVER, March 12.—The Denver Times has announced the result of its prize opinion contest as to the guilt or innocence of Harry Thaw. Of a total of 16,763 opinions, 4,266 were for conviction and 12,497 for acquittal. The winning opinions were:

First prize, Augustus A. Foster, Montrose, Col., "Guilty. The wretch who shares responsibility for a woman's dishonor, and to save his worthless neck, proclaims that dishonor to the world, deserves a double death."

Second prize, Mrs. Cunningham, Denver: "Not guilty, Harry Thaw knowing what he did, forgave Evelyn. Christ forgave the Magdalen! He did not forgive the man. White got what he deserved."

Third prize, C. Jurgens, Denver: "Guilty. Acquittal means legal indemnity of a heinous crime, to which thousands might resort to correct a very prevalent disregard for the conjugal relations."

In making the awards, logic in expression of opinions, grammatical construction and evidence of consideration of evidence and facts of the case were taken into account.

P. E. ISLAND RAILWAY STATION ROBBED OF \$82

CHARLOTTETOWN, March 12.—This morning Sergeant Detective Bradley returned from Montserrat where he had been investigating a robbery in the railway station, at that place, on Friday evening. On Saturday morning Mr. McLeod, the station agent, on opening his safe found that the contents, \$75, had been stolen and that the till had been broken open and \$7 taken therefrom, the sum of \$82 in all being missing. The bag containing the \$75 had been opened, the slip of paper containing a memo of the amount removed and left in the safe. All the cash was taken except two one dollar bills. Entrance was effected through a front window. Whether the robber knew of the combination of the safe, or whether the station agent in closing it had not turned the handle sufficiently to lock it securely, is not known, at any rate the safe had been opened without the mechanism being injured. On Saturday evening Mr. Robertson, paymaster, and Mr. Huggan, accompanied Sergeant Bradley to Montserrat. The robber left no trace of his presence, but the Sergeant is hopeful of securing his man, and interesting developments may be expected.

RICH MISER STARVES AMIDST HIS HOARD

LONDON, March 12.—A miser's tragic death in the garret of a well furnished house was discovered by the Nottingham police yesterday.

The house was in an indescribably filthy condition, and there was many years' accumulation of dust.

The body discovered was that of a man named Alfred Martin, who had not been seen by the neighbors since the death of his mother, on January 7, and who had evidently died from starvation.

The neighbors were unaware that he continued to live in the house. His body was in an emaciated condition.

The police found sums of money in innumerable packets hidden in crevices of a sofa, on shelves and in drawers. The total amount was about \$50.

The man's hair and beard were matted, and his nails protruded an inch and a quarter over the finger ends. The only food in the house was a loaf months old.

TEMPERANCE FEDERATION
AND POLICE COMMISSION

(Special to the Star.)
MONCTON, March 12.—A meeting of the temperance federation was held last night to discuss the proposed commission question for the police of Moncton. Rev. H. E. Thomas presided. The police commission question was discussed very thoroughly, after which a resolution was passed expressing disapproval of the proposed legislation. The secretary was instructed to wire the city representatives in government to this effect.

Members of the federation were of the opinion there were some redeeming features in the proposal, but they also thought it was not in the best interests of the temperance movement to pass it at present. Some severe criticism of members of council who voted against the dismissal of ex-Chief Chappel at the recent council meeting was indulged in. Some of the speakers asked to give some explanation of the reasons for the admission should be their vote.

PICTURES PAINTED IN POLAR REGIONS

LONDON, March 12.—The exhibition of the works of M. Alexander Borissoff, painted in the adventures in the Polar regions, opened yesterday at the Grafton Galleries.

The pictures show the many dangers and hardships through which the artist passed. Two very large scenes, it artificially from one side in a darkened room, show the effect of the midnight sun and of moonlight on the glaciers most realistically.

Great white bears are seen prowling about on the snowfields, and the water of the Arctic regions appears black in contrast with the gleaming snow around. Several of the sketches show great blocks of ice, weighing over 100,000 tons, whirling and grinding, dashing and splintering, around the artist.

The total eclipse of the sun, which furnishes M. Borissoff with some of his most weird effects, turned the clouds into inky masses upon a vivid orange sky.

One of the most gruesome of the series of paintings is entitled "The Cemetery." It shows a stretch of snow, broken only by a few wooden crosses, while in the foreground a solitary white fox crouches amid bleaching human bones. The crosses mark the burial place of the inhabitants of a whole district, who died during an extra severe winter.

HARD TIMES FOR DOGS ON LONDON STREETS

LONDON, March 12.—More than 6000 lost and stray dogs were admitted to the dogs' home at Battersea during the first six weeks of this year. This number is nearly 40 per cent. higher than the admissions for the corresponding period of last year.

The majority of them have already passed through the lethal chamber to the crematorium, but there are in the home at the present time fully 1000 dogs of every imaginable breed, and the kennel accommodation is severely taxed in spite of the recent extensions.

Although the number of admissions has increased so largely, the number of persons visiting the home to search for lost dogs or to buy new pets has fallen off—a combination of circumstances which suggests that many dog owners have been chary of assuming the responsibility which the new act imposes on them.

The excessive immigration, however, is acting very detrimentally on the finances of the home, which depends entirely on subscriptions and the sale of unclaimed dogs.

END OF RECTOR'S ELOPEMENT.

Flight With Woman Parishoner Leads to the Divorce Court.

LONDON, March 12.—The elopement of a country rector with a young lady parishoner was described during the hearing of a divorce case yesterday.

The runaway pair were the Rev. Alfred von Ederheim, clerk in holy orders, formerly rector of Bladon, Forest of Dean, Gloucestershire, and Miss Stubbs, who resided with her father in Bladon parish. The living of Bladon is in the gift of the Stubbs family.

The two went to New Zealand as far back as 1886. Later they returned to England, and are now living in Brighton as Mr. and Mrs. Gibson. A decree nisi was granted to Mrs. von Ederheim.

TO TOUR THE WORLD.
Two Eldest Sons of the Prince of Wales to Make Trip.

LONDON, March 12.—It is stated that Prince Edward and Prince Albert, the two eldest sons of the Prince of Wales, will in due course make a tour of the world in a battleship. Prince Edward is destined for the army and Prince Albert for the navy.
