

CANADA'S RECORD TRADE WITH THE UNITED STATES It Has More Than Doubled in the Last It Has More Than Doubled in the Last WITH THE UNITED STATES Ten Years-All Records Smashed SPANISH GOVERNMENT by 1910.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—The high-est record ever made in trade between Canada and the United States was that of the last calendar year, according to official figures of the bureau of statis-tics department of commerce and labor. During the last ten years this trade has more than doubled. In no former year have either imports from or exports to Canada equalled the re-cord of 1909.


