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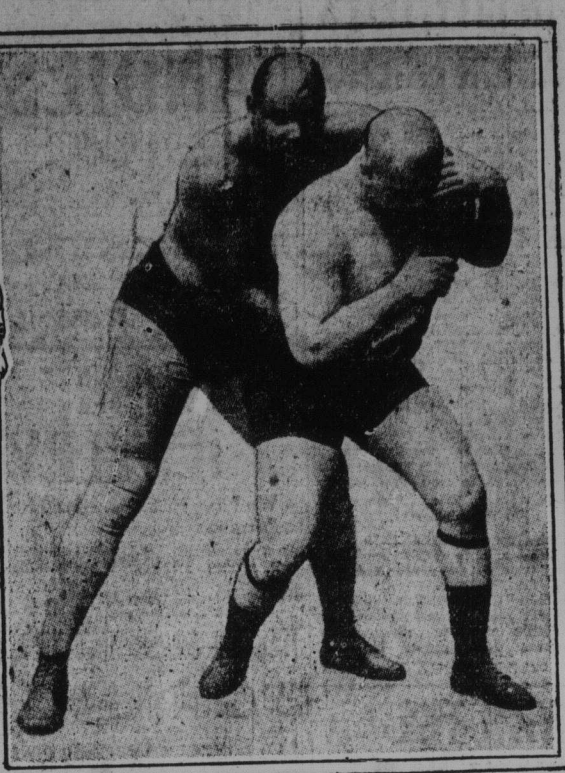
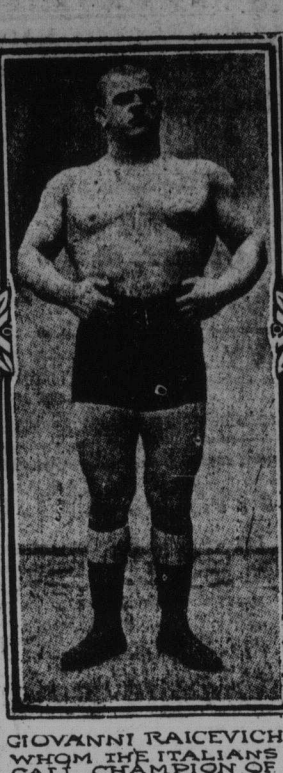
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GIOVANNI RAICEVICH, ITALIAN WRESTLER, CLAIMS CHAMPIONSHIP OF THE WORLD

Handicap

London, July 9.—The minutes of the meeting of the Jockey Club held July 1, have just been published. At that meeting the Jockey Club adopted a rule that "no weight shall be allotted to any horse in any handicap until he has run three times in the United Kingdom." The minutes showing Lord Durham in a long speech, proposing the new rule, cited numerous cases in its support. He considered that the management, training and running of American horses this year had been absolutely above reproach. It was not the fault of the owners of the horses or the jockeys that the handicapper did not know how to weight the horses, but the fault of the Jockey Club, because it allowed handicappers to adjust weights for horses they had never seen.

In his opinion the American horses this year had been wrongly and wonder- fully handicapped. He then in- stanced numerous cases in which he said handicappers had either taken the American form or had merely guessed and he declared that he was forced to this kind of handicapping a pure farce.

Lord Brassey, Mr. Rothschild and others opposed the rule. They thought the fact that the handicappers had been lenient did not justify the new and troublesome rule. Sport- ing Life also strongly opposes the rule which still needs ratification at the next meeting of the club.
