One of the most philanthropic women in America, whose gifts are usually made in the most unobtrusive way, is Helen Miller Gould, the oldest daughter of Jay Gould.

After the death of her parents Helen Miller Gould was left in charge of the younger members of the church, who are to be married in the near future.

When they had attained their majority Miss Gould always retiring and unassuming, devoted her time to the help of others.

The Christian idea that wealth is not for one's personal pleasure alone, but for the welfare of others, certainly seems the noblest, and those who have money or broader culture, owe it a debt to those who have fewer opportunities.

Miss Gould's benefactions are not recorded for the public eye. It is known that she has built a church in memory of her father, that she has erected libraries in various parts of the country, endowed colleges, established scholarships, built dormitories in universities and made large gifts to private individuals.

She maintains a home for crippled children and her benefactions to the Railroad Branch of the Young Men's Christian Association and the Navy Branch of the same institution are matters that could not escape public record, however reluctant the donor might be to have them made known.

Miss Gould is a woman of quiet but possessing appearance, with a gentle manner that hides a resolute will and tremendous executive ability.
