Prominent Citizen Of Chatham Is Dead

William Wyse, One of Oldest Residents of North Shore Town Passes Away—Preparations for May Day.

Chatham, April 25.—Wm. Wyse, one of Chatham's oldest citizens and probably the most generally known resident of the Miramichi, passed away at noon yesterday at his home here, aged 80 years. Mr. Wyse had been in failing health for the past two years, and the end was generally known to have been near at hand. He leaves a wife and three children surviving him. The latter are Bernard of New York; Barclay, of Charlotte, and Florence, at home. The deceased is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Loudon, of Chatham, and three brothers, Henry of Newcastle; James of Chicago; and John, who is also in the United States.

The late Mr. Wyse had spent practically the whole of his life in the Miramichi, and had been identified with a great number of projects connected with the Miramichi, and taken considerable part in the public life of the county. As a young man he worked for the Shireffs, an old-time well-known firm engaged in the fishing and shipping business. Later he branched out for himself in the fishing business and had many tales to tell of the volume of trade that

passed through Chatham in those old days. For many years Mr. Wyse was very overworked for the federal government, and he knew the Miramichi thoroughly. One of his achievements while he occupied this post was the drafting of a map of the river showing the location of every fishing stand then in existence.

More than the usual amount of mourning is to be planned for May 1st of this year. Three of the young men who at present living at Regent Hall, took the former Watt property which was moved to a new location Upper Water street, in order to the right of way for the new street into the town, and they will move on May 1st to these new lodges. The three who are settling up here are A. W. Wilbur, G. B. Martin and Wm. Massey.

Mrs. J. P. Wood have taken an upper side of the King street house formerly occupied by Wm. Glendinning and family and will start housekeeping.

The late Mr. Wyse, who has purchased the use of the late George Tait, will remain from the corner of Princess and Front streets, on May 1st.

The it in the river started to run yesterday and the Miramichi is now clear as it flows on Sheldrake Island, fifteen miles below Chatham, and the river steamers made their first trip to the mouth of the river. The first boat to cross to river was the Arthur of the Dominion Pulp Co., which made the trip yesterday.

Rev. C. J. Millage, of St. John, took the service in St. Mary's and St. Paul's yesterday, in the absence of the rector, Archdeacon Forsyth, who is in Toronto. In the evening at St. Mary's the preacher made special reference to the "Fiftieth Psalm" and a special service for the dead was held. A prayer was read from the service for the burial of the dead and instead of the usual recessional hymn, the Dead March in Saul was played.

The debate in the Y. M. C. A. rooms Wednesday evening on the question of the abolition of the death penalty was won by the side advocating the abolition of the extreme measure, who argued it did not inspire the terror counted upon to make it effective; that it permitted of too many miscarriages of justice, in allowing those men who deserved some punishment less than death, to escape free, and in its being sometimes inflicted upon innocent people convicted on technicalities. Greater punishment, they argued, lay in a life imprisonment sentence, and as a murderer should have a chance to repent and in some small manner, redeem the outrage he had committed before God and man.

The negative strongly clung to the principle that it is right to take life by need, be it in defence, so has the state the right to take life in defence of its laws, and well-being. The Bible was quoted to show that there was a justification for the law and the necessity was argued on the ground that a relaxation of the law would result in a great increase in crime.

The judge, C. J. Mesrobian, who gave the debate a very able criticism and summary of their arguments, and declared that on the merits of the debate, the speakers in favor of the abolition of the death penalty had a slight lead in arguments, and in delivery, so that he awarded the debate to them. One of the speakers for the affirmative was Anthony Adams, and the other was Mr. J. H. Brown.

TITANIC PICTURES SHOWN AT NICKEL

Large Crowds Saw Excellent Timely Films Yesterday—Launching of Great Liner—The Carpathia's Arrival.

That the horror of the Titanic disaster still clings in the memory of the people of this city and that they are keenly interested in the subject, was evidenced forcibly yesterday when vast throngs, witnessed the Nickel's great show, which included a special film depicting the most important events connected with the brief history of the giant of the seas. The pictures which were from a photographic viewpoint superior to any ever seen in this city, dealt chiefly with the launching of the liner, the construction and incidents following the terrible catastrophe, such as the arrival in New York of the Carpathia with her survivors and the pathetic scenes incidental to the arrival.

The portions of the film which dealt with the building and launching of the Titanic were of vital interest. The audience were given an insight into the immensity of an undertaking such as that of constructing and equipping a vessel of the dimensions of the Titanic. The launching of the liner was also exhibited, and as the massive hull of the liner of the sea proudly glided into the water the picture undoubtedly affected the audience with thoughts altogether different to those experienced by the happy throng which rent the air with cheers as the vessel gracefully took the water on the eventful day of her launching.

Among the other scenes depicted were those of the gallant commander of the Carpathia, and the deeply pathetic scenes witnessed at her dock were also included in the film. All the scenes were reproduced with a clearness and fidelity seldom attained in cinematography.

In addition to this extra feature, the programme contained a biblical drama beautifully colored and staged most elaborately and excellently acted by the Pathé players. "Her Face" in two other films were also numbered in the bill for the week opening.

Miss Clark with a new number, "The Same Old Welcome," and Bert Morey in "The Mysterious Rag," pleased the audiences.

The same extraordinary programme will be repeated this afternoon and evening.

NEW FISHERY PROTECTION VESSEL For Service on Pacific Coast.

Tenders are invited and will be received by the undersigned for the design and construction of the above vessel up to noon 17th June, 1912.

General particulars and a guidance print showing the typical nature of the vessel required, for information in preparing a design, may also be obtained on application to the undersigned.

The vessel is to be delivered free of all charges (at H. M. V. Dockyard, Esquimaux), the time of delivery to be stated in the tenders. Special consideration will be given to early delivery.

An alternative tender may be submitted if so desired using Diesel Heavy Oil Engines as the motive power for propulsion, but such engines would be required of the 2 cycle reversible type, designed to use Texas and other heavy oils.

The Department does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender, the awarding of the Contract will depend on the suitability of the design for the service required as well as a consideration of the tender price. The tenderer should also state for what price two vessels of the type proposed will be supplied.

A certified cheque payable to the Deputy Minister of the Naval Service, amounting to \$10,000 must accompany design and tender, and a guarantee that the contract will be undertaken if awarded. If two vessels are decided on a further deposit of \$10,000 will be required.
