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SEVEN ST. JOHN MATRICULANTS IN FIRST DIVISION

Arthur J. Rockwell, of Fredericton, Leads Province; Bernard F. Haley, of St. John, Second. Fredericton, Aug. 2.—The leader in the University of New Brunswick matriculation examinations is Arthur T. Rockwell, son of A. W. Rockwell, C. P. R. station agent at St. Marys.

The leader is a graduate of the Fredericton High school and his record at that institution was an exceptionally fine one and included winning two medals last year. Bernard F. Haley, of St. John, is second, and there are seven St. John candidates in first division. The showing of the Fredericton High school graduates in these examinations was an excellent one, three of them being also listed among the first six. The board of examiners report 162 candidates having written the matriculation and 12 candidates the High school leaving examinations.

Of the candidates for matriculation 16 passed in the first division, 60 in the second division (one of these in engineering), 20 in the third division, 42 in the third division, conditionally, while 24 failed to pass in any division.
