"TOURTH—Considerable representation of the Unionist interests in the south and west of Ireland will be provided through the nomination of their representatives to the Irish senate. It is proposed that the senate sit and act with the Irish commons during the temporary settlement, thus safeguarding the interests of the Unionists.

"FIFTH—The temporary settlement is to continue until one year after the termination of the war. At that time the whole arrangement will come under the review of the great imperial conference, which is to be held to adjust the government of the empire.

"SIXTH—The frame-work of Irish finance in the home rule act will not be altered, but some increases will be made in the sum to be transferred to Irish revenues from the imperial treasury.

"SEVENTH—A new lord fleutenant will shortly be appointed as a preliminary to the adoption of the new arrangement."
