Senator Dan Derbyshire, Brockville, suffered a stroke of paralysis a week ago and is now in a serious condition at the General Hospital. His right side and his speech are affected.

Another Smiths Falls boy has made the supreme sacrifice in the Empire's cause. Pte. Clarence Ferguson, son of Mrs. Emma Ferguson, died in the Red Cross hospital, Paris, from a wound received in battle with the Canadian forces.

Rev. R. C. H. Sinclair has been spending a week in Carleton Place. He is packing up his household effects preparatory to removing to his new home at Kenmore. The family have so grown into our citizenship since coming to reside here that we are loathe to see them go, and yet we can but wish them well, feeling that what is our loss will be another's gain.

Smiths Falls is to have a new industry by the establishment there of a factory by Columbus Life Saving Suits Limited, which will be in operation by the first of July. The new industry will employ at the start at least 50 employees, men and girls, and will add at least \$5000 to the monthly pay roll of the town immediately. Inside of a few months it is expected that 150 hands will be working in the plant.

Taxes in Two Payments.

The Town Council passed a bylaw last night giving the ratepayers the opportunity of paying their taxes in two instalments if they wish, the first payment to be made between the 10th and 20th July, when 2 1/2 p.c. (the equivalent of 6 p.c.) will be allowed on the money paid in. The payment must be made voluntarily to the collector at his office in the town hall between the hours of two and five o'clock in the afternoon within the days specified to obtain the discount. There is no limit as to what portion of your taxes you pay, it may be a fourth, a third, a half or three fourths, just as suits the payer. It is estimated that the money thus obtained will obviate the necessity of the Council borrowing for current expenses, whilst the discount allowed will be no greater than the interest paid on a loan, the taxpayer receiving the interest instead of the bank.

THREE DEATHS IN BECKWITH.

Inside of 24 Hours, including Mr. Archibald Dewar, the Reeve of the Township.

Seldom does the Rider on the White Horse make his demands so rapidly in one little section as he did the past few days in Beckwith, when three well-known figures—all natives of the old township and descendants of the early Scottish pioneers—were summoned to their last home, and in the trio that received the final call was the honored reeve of the municipality.

ARCHIBALD DEWAR.

Mr. Dewar had been suffering from a stroke for a fortnight or so, the last few days sinking very rapidly, until death released him on Sunday evening. Archibald Dewar was the only son of the late Peter Dewar, one of the early Scotch pioneer settlers of Beckwith who came out in 1818. He was a man of sterling character, most highly esteemed by all who knew him, and his demise will be deeply lamented. He had attained the ripe old age of 82 years, and was still in harness as it were. When a young man Mr. Dewar married Miss Stewart, a sister of Mr. John Stewart, who now resides in Manitoba, and shortly afterwards left the home, stood in the 7th concession for Kenmore, where he engaged in mercantile life. Whilst here his wife died, and he returned again to the farm, where he has since resided. He married again, his second wife being Miss Scott, a daughter of the late Robert Scott, of the 9th Line, who survives. Ten children blessed his fireside, five of whom survive, Alexander A. and Mrs. Duncan Ferguson of Ottawa, Edward in Manitoba, George F. at Parrie, and Alfred at home. For over forty years Mr. Dewar has been active in municipal life. He was councillor for some years and reeve for over 30 years, occupying that responsible position to the last. He also served a term as warden of the county of Lanark, and was probably the best known councillor at the board. In politics Mr. Dewar was a Liberal, and in religion a Presbyterian. The funeral takes place to-day, to the family burial ground, and will probably be one of the largest ever seen in the township.

MRS. RANEY McNEELY.

On Saturday afternoon Mrs. McNeely, wife of Mr. Raney McNeely, 10th Concession Beckwith, passed away very suddenly whilst sitting in her chair, at the ripe old age of 83 years and 3 months. The deceased lady had no specific ailment, the physical machinery having seemingly just worn out. Mrs. Robertson was before marriage Catherine Robertson, daughter of the late Peter Robertson, another of the pioneer settlers. In 1861 she married Mr. McNeely, and for over half a century they lived together, their family consisting of seven children, five of whom survive—three daughters, Mrs. Robt. McLinton, Mrs. Elisha Morris and Mrs. R. Sample and two sons, D. R. and W. J. McNeely. Mrs. McNeely was a member of St. James church, and the service at the home yesterday afternoon was conducted by Rev. Canon Elliott, interment being made in Pine Grove cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs. Robt. Sample, Elisha Morris, James Rattray, William J. McNeely, Millar McNeely and Robt. McLinton.

JOHN MCARTHUR.

After an illness of two or three years Mr. John McArthur, of the 7th concession, sank quietly to rest on Sunday evening, of paralysis, aged 67 years. The deceased was a son of the late Peter McArthur, another of the pioneer settlers, and spent his entire life upon the original homestead. He was a man widely known and most highly esteemed, although of a reserved disposition and never seeking or accepting public office. In religion he was a Presbyterian, and a member of the church at Franktown. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Cameron, a daughter of the late Allan Cameron, and one son and one daughter, Allan C. and Miss Ella, at home. The funeral takes place this afternoon to Pine Grove cemetery, and will likely be very largely attended. THE HERALD extends sympathy to the bereaved families in their hour of grief.
