Prices in Germany. A farmer who lives in the vicinity of Hespeler recently received a letter from his brother in Germany, and in it he stated the prices they have to pay for eggs, meat, etc. Here they are: Eggs, \$3.60 per dozen or 30c. a piece, butter \$4.00 per lb., chickens \$6.00 each, geese \$12 each, an ordinary cow, \$250. Pork, it was stated, was practically out of the question or unknown since the war started. Many other articles ranged in very high prices. Comparing these with Canadian prices, they are from 5 to 10 times as high.

Command of 8th Falls to Lt.-Col. McCrimmon. Lieut.-Col. J.D. McCrimmon of London has taken over command of the 28th Perth Regiment, Stratford, from Lieut.-Col. William Lawrence, who has been commanding officer since 1912.

Five years is the normal tenure of command, but Col. Lawrence's time extended while the war was on. With his transfer to the reserve of officers the command falls to the next senior officer, Lieut.-Col. McCrimmon, who went overseas with the 33rd Battalion.

W.D. Cargill's Home Destroyed by Fire. The beautiful residence of W.D. Cargill, M.P.P., Cargill, was totally destroyed by fire at night. The origin of the fire is unknown, but it is believed to have originated in the attic, due probably to a defective chimney. A shed adjoining the premises was also destroyed. The loss will probably exceed \$50,000.

Over 20,000 in Brantford. Brantford, despite the voluntary departure of some 800 foreigners to their native clime, has gained 1,824 in population during the past year. The population is now 30,549 and the civic assessment, \$25,197,035, of which \$20,962,475 is taxable. This is an increase in the total assessment of \$610,370.

Assessment Commissioner A.G. Ludlow is most optimistic over the future of Brantford. He sees a 35,000 population in 1920 and by 1925 a population of close to the 50,000 mark in the future. He sees a \$10,000,000 increase in the assessment next year, based on the fact that Brantford is the lowest assessed city in Canada in proportion to the value.

Through increased values at the present time the growth of the city's population has outstripped the accommodation and there is at present a need for 500 new homes.

FARMER COMPLAINS ABOUT BIG BOARD

R. L. Richardson Would Give Board a Chance. Ottawa, Sept. 30.—The Board of Commerce was again under fire from the rural members in the Commons to-night when the bill fixing their salaries was under consideration. Mr. Donald Sutherland, South Oxford, led the attack on the board. Mr. Sutherland particularly objected to its attitude towards the dairy industry. The action of the board was such as to discourage production and to drive farmers off the land. An order had been fixed in regard to the price of milk, although he understood that the order had not been rescinded. Dairymen in North Oxford were not making butter because it was unprofitable. Factories to manufacture condensed milk were being opened and the farmers were selling to them instead of making butter. He said that duties which should be performed by Parliament were being relegated to an irresponsible commission. Mr. O'Connor should go after the professor rather than the producer. A man who would issue the order in regard to the dairy industry was not worth \$5,000 a year. DEFENDS COMMISSION. A defender of the commission was found in R. L. Richardson, Springfield. Mr. Richardson said that there had been an outcry from end to end of the country in favor of such a commission and yet as soon as it was appointed the commission and the Government were attacked. As far as he could see the commission had struck no blow at the farming community. The farmer members were only attacking the commission with a view to standing well with their constituency. He particularly praised Judge Robson, who had given up a salary of \$15,000 a year to serve the country. As for Mr. O'Connor he might lack ballast, but he believed he would do good work under Judge Robson's leadership. He closed with a plea to give the commission a chance.
