-and fixthly, the commission of vice-admiral, granted to the faid major-general Murray, whereby all the laws of the English court of admiralty were introduced into the faid province ;—and feventhly and lastiy, the statute of the first of Queen Elizabeth, for restoring to the crown of England the antient jurifdiction over the eftate ecclefiaftical and spiritual; which prohibits all exercise of the Pope's pretended power and jurifdiction in all the dominions of the crown of England, as well in those that hereafter should belong to it, as in those that belonged to it at that time, and confequently in the faid province of Que-bec; and fome other acts of parliament both before and fince the conquest of the faid province, which manifestly extend to and bind it. All these instruments are evidently neceffary to be carefully confidered upon this occafion by the members of his Majesty's privy-council; and, if (as there is good reafon to hope it will) this important fubject should be brought before the two houses of parliament, to be confidered alfo by the members of those houses. Now this could not easily be done without the help of some such collection as the present: because the above-mentioned inftruments are no where else to be found printed together; and many of them are not printed at all in any other book, but lie difperfed in the original manuscripts only, or in the records of the feveral public offices; from which it would be very expensive, and be attended with great delay, to cause a sufficient number of copies for the use of so many persons to be transcribed. Ìt is therefore hoped that the prefent collection of them will be thought a proper and useful work. It con-tains, befides the important inftruments above-mentioned, fome
