MARKET REVIEW AND FORECAST

Toronto, Monday, July 10.—Business is fairly healthy before the midsummer lull. Country buyers are more conservative than heretofore, and large rush orders are not expected.

From all parts of the country come reports of early frost is short in some sections, and the fruit crop generally will be short, but other crops are excellent. Enquiries for the fruit situation have relieved the labor situation in Ontario, but large excursions to the West may cause a scarcity of labor later on. A few more prices for farm products during the past week show dairy produce and eggs firm, corn and oats stronger with cattle weaker all round. Hogs are again decidedly below the \$7 mark. Call money rates here at 5½ to 6 per cent.

WHEAT.

Quotations for wheat on this market are a little lower than a week ago owing to weak cables from the Old Country. On the Chicago market wheat advanced rapidly during the early part of the week owing to reports of damage by heat and drought. At the end of the scare prices dropped suddenly to their old level. HAY AND STRAW

Most of the hay arriving on the market is of inferior quality and difficult to sell. Choice timothy finds a ready market. Quotations on hay at Toronto are: No. 1, timothy, 82c to 83c; mixed, 89c to 91c; straw, 86c to 88c. On the Farmers' Market No. 1 timothy is 81c to 83c; No. 2, 82c to 84c; straw, bundled, 81c to 83c; loose, 86c to 88c. The same conditions apply at Montreal. No. 1 hay is quoted at \$1.00; No. 2, 89c to 91c; No. 3, 88c to 90c.

HIDES.

Quotations for hides are decidedly stronger. Prices by city dealers are as follows: No. 1, inspected steers and cows, 12c; No. 2, 11c; No. 3, 10c; calf skins, 13c. Prices paid by country dealers are: Hides, cured, 12c; sheep skins, 8c to 10c; lamb, 25c to 30c; spring lambs, 25c to 30c; horse hides, 8c; horse hair, 3c to 5c.

POTATOES AND BEANS.

The market is steady and unchanged. Potatoes are now quoted at 81c a bag for Ontario, out of store, and 81c to 81c 50 a bag in car lots. At Montreal potatoes are scarce, and prices have again advanced to 81c a bag for Green Mountains.

Beans here are quoted at 81c for primes and 82c for bulk and hand picked.

FRUIT AND VEGETABLES.

Excessively hot, dry weather is retarding the crop of small fruits, and the market is firm. Latest quotations are: Strawberries, 11c; raspberries, 15c to 16c; cherries, 11c; blueberries, 10c to 11c; peaches, 10c to 12c; red currants, 11c; blackberries, 10c to 11c; cabbage, 8c to 10c; head lettuce, 5c; wax beans, 10c to 11c.

EGGS AND POULTRY.

Quotations here for eggs are unchanged.

Wool is taken at the following prices: Washed fleeces, 10c to 12c; unwashed fleeces, 10c to 12c; reject, 10c.

PRODUCE.

The situation with regard to butter and cheese is unchanged. Receipts are plentiful and demand quite equal to the supply. Quotations are as follows: Creamery prints, 25c to 26c; solids, 19c to 21c; dairy prints, 15c to 16c; inferior, 15c to 16c; old cheese are quoted at 14c; twins, 14c; new, large, 12c; new twins, 12c.

HONEY.

Wholesale quotations for honey are as follows: Buckwheat, 6c to 7c a lb. in time; 5c in barrels; strained clover honey, 5c in time; 4c to 5c in bulk. No. 1 comb honey is quoted at 8c to 25c a box.

HORSE MARKET.

So little trade is moving in horse flesh that it is hard to give accurate quotations. Prices are quoted purely nominal as follows: Good heavy drafters, \$250 to \$300; medium weight, \$150 to \$200. Good agricultural horses bring \$150 to \$200, and fair quality ones \$100 to \$150. Express horses are quoted at \$200 to \$250; trotters, \$150 to \$200; and saddlers, \$100 to \$200.

LIVE STOCK.

Prices on the live stock markets this past week have averaged lower than on the week previous. The extreme heat has lessened demand. A week ago to-day's offerings were liberal, and prices averaged 10c to 15c above the market previous. About 1,000 head of steers, or half the offering, was acquired by Canadian and United States buyers for shipment to Great Britain. A good price for good quality cattle in any quantity. Butcher prices are lower in the face of a fair demand.

On the Tuesday market competition was confined to Toronto and Montreal buyers. Prices for butcher steers were unimpaired, but cows were down. Prices held firm for the closing market of the week, but here a few choice steers dropped. It seems that people do not eat much meat in warm weather, and the light run was disposed of at a discount. The animals showed the effect of burned up pastures, and some of the cattle were in very poor condition. Quotations are as follows: Export cattle, choice, \$5.75 to \$6; bulls, \$4.50 to \$4.80; butcher steers, choice, \$5.75 to \$5.80; common to medium, \$5.85; butchers cows, choice, \$4.60 to \$4.80; common to good, \$3.75 to \$4.50; bulls, \$4.25 to \$4.75; feeders, \$5.25 to \$5.85; stockers, \$3.75 to \$4; calves, \$1.50 to \$2.25. Trade in milkers is slow, the demand being only for choice quality. Quotations are: Milk cows, \$1.50 to \$2.00; medium, \$2.50 to \$3.00; springers, \$2.50 to \$4.00.

Sheep are stronger than a week ago, and demand is good at advanced prices. Cows are quoted at \$2.50 to \$4.50; bulls, \$2.75 to \$3.25; calves are \$2.50 to \$3.25. Hogs suffered a decline the first of the week and have held steady at the lower price: \$7.10 on the market and \$7.25 at country points.

Hot weather has weakened the live stock market. On the local, and especially on the Montreal, and Quebec, steers have declined 50 cents to 75c. There has been little demand from local country buyers, as they have a large supply on hand as they can be conveniently carried in hot weather. Steers sell at 85c to 86c; cows, 83c to 85c; and bulls, 83c to 85c. The market for sheep is strong on account of increased offerings ewes selling at 83c to 85c and lambs 83c to 85c. Calves are also weak, selling at 83c to 85c each.

CHEESE MARKETS.

Montreal, July 8.—The Quebec Cheese Makers' Cooperative Society sold finest cheese at 11½c; fine, 11½c to 11½c; No. 2, 11½c to 11½c. The market for cheese is strong on account of 6 to 8 weeks old.
