tinue in the course, which experience proves to be heneficial, easy and perfectly adequate to its purposes.

I shall cause the estimate for the fervice of the enfuing year to be presented, and trust with fatisfaction in the experience of former years, that you will cheerfully provide competent supplies, for the honorable support of his Majesty's Government, and for the services of the current year.

Mr. President of the Council, and

Mr. Speaker of the Affembly,

As it is fo evidently the public intereft, as well as for your own particular convenience, to expedite the affairs of the Province, I have not a doubt of your affiduity and harmony, and on my part, affure you of my ready affiftance and due concurrence in whatever may appear to be conducive to the public good.

On Motion, ordered, that Mr. Wallace, Mr. Belcher, and Mr. Robie, be a Committee to prepare an Addrefs in Answer to His Excellency's Speech.

Mr. Speaker having informed the Houle, that Mr. Adolphus Vieth, their Serjeant at Arms, was defirous of refigning that Office in confequence of being unable to give due attendance to the duty thereof, confistent with a Military appointment he now held; and also, that Mr. John Nevill, their Messenger was deceased, thereupon, Mr. Charles Stewart Powell, was appointed Serjeant at Arms, and

Mr. Ifrael Conky, Meffenger.

On Motion, ordered, that Mr. Chipman, Mr. Belcher, Mr. Wollenbaupt, Mr. Robie, and Mr. Crane, be a Committee of this Houle, for the purpole of examining the public Accounts jointly with a Committee of his Majefty's Council and reporting thereon, and that the Clerk do acquaint the Council therewith.

On Motion of Mr. Millidge, refolved, that Mr. Millidge, Mr. Wilkins, and Mr. Morris, be a Committee to make enquiry respecting the Election held for the County of Sydney, and to report thereon to the House.

On Motion of Mr. *Millidge, refolved*, That a Committe of claims be appointed, to whom all Petitions prefented to this Houfe be referred, for their examination and report.

Refolved, That no Petition of a private nature be received after Wednefday the 27th inftant.

Then the House adjourned till To-morrow at One of the Clock.
