Prominent Contractor Passes.

By the sudden death of Mr. Joseph Schickler, which took place shortly after midnight last Thursday morning, Mildmay loses a valued and very highly respected citizen. During the past two years Mr. Schickler had been suffering somewhat with asthma and heart trouble, but had been able to attend to his work as usual. On Wednesday evening he retired to bed in his usual health, and about midnight, Mrs. Schickler noticed that he seemed to be distressed in breathing, and tried to arouse him. Her efforts were of no avail, however, Mr. Schickler expiring before any of the members of the family could be summoned. Deceased was born sixty-three years ago in Mornington township, where his parents, who came from Germany, had settled. He was married in 1885 to Miss Amelia Hill, after which they resided for two years at Glenallan, when they came to Carrick. Mr. Schickler was a great worker and a clever mechanic, and preferred construction work to farming, and during the past ten or twelve years has done a tremendous amount of concrete building work, which stands as a monument to his skill and conscientious workmanship. Two years ago he became a resident of Mildmay and his death is deeply lamented here, as he was generally regarded as an upright man, and a useful citizen. He is survived by his widow, five daughters and one son, Mrs. Jos. Balk of Stratford, Mrs. Anton Neilson of Detroit, Mrs. Raymond Young of Mildmay, Mrs. Fred Harvey of Texas, and Tillie and Edward at home. One son, George, died at Moose Jaw, Sask., on Oct. 30, 1918. Four sisters, Mrs. Wm. Rowles of Vancouver, Mrs. Wm. Schnarr and Mrs. John Reist of Kitchener and Mrs. Jos. Huizer of Waterloo, and one brother, Mr. Philip Schickler of Holland, N. Y., also survive him. The funeral which took place on Sunday afternoon at the Mildmay Lutheran cemetery, was attended by a very large number of friends. The sincere sympathy of the whole community is extended to the bereaved family.
