**12,000,000 in United States Subject to Army Service**  
 Census Bureau Estimates Number of Men in United States Capable of Bearing Arms  
 (New York Herald)  
 The Census Bureau estimates that there are upwards of twenty-one million men in the United States between the ages of eighteen and forty-five. In determining the academic question of how many of these men would be available for general conscription, put into the field, says the Philadelphia Press, there are a number of deductions to be made.  
 One is the total of alien whites, Chinese and Japanese who would be unavailable for military duty—a total that the Census Bureau fixes at 1,888,000. Another is the total of physically unfit, which could only be determined by medical examination. Still a third of those in trades and occupations necessary to the sustenance of the country and the maintenance of the army and navy. For, though modern warfare exalts the services of the entire population of a nation, it requires that a considerable industrial population be left behind to supply the machinery and the munitions of war. How many of America's men of fighting age are engaged in indispensable trades has not yet been computed.  
 Russia's fighting strength is estimated on paper at about eighteen millions. Germany's at a little less than eight millions. Austria's at about five millions. In the case of the latter two nations these totals were probably reduced by deductions for "indispensable trades" and increased again during this war by the calling out of classes less than eighteen and more than forty-five years. These estimates likewise probably fail to take into account the physical disability of a large percentage of males of fighting age.  
 It is generally computed that about eight per cent. of a country's population is available for military duty. On this basis of computation Germany's total of availables would be brought down to five millions and

## That Tragedy at St. Jacques

**A Story of Heroism and Sadness—Mr. Burke's Son and the Hump and Sees His Father Drowned—Three Victims Were Well and Favorably Known**  
 From a gentleman who arrived recently from St. Jacques we have received an account (all that will likely ever be known) of the tragedy which occurred in Fortune Bay some days ago.  
 Mr. Ryan and Mr. Clinton were returning from Long Harbor to St. Jacques in the "Caribou"—Mr. Ryan's yacht. Somewhere between Chapple Island and St. Jacques Island the yacht upset, having doubtless been caught in one of the squalls so frequent in this neighborhood. The "Caribou," which was towing two dories, sank almost immediately. Mr. Isaac Burke, the light-keeper on St. Jacques Island, saw the yacht turn over and he hastened to the Back Cove (in the rear of St. Jacques) and raced to Dr. Fitzgerald's whose motor-boat lay in the harbour. A messenger was immediately dispatched to Belleoram to Capt. Horwood of the "Hump." Dr. Fitzgerald, with Alex. and George Tibbo, immediately got the motor-boat under way. Mr. Burke accompanied them on their doleful quest. It was now quite dark, and very early in the afternoon a darkness, such as Captain Parsons reported last week on the arrival of the Sagona, had enveloped the whole settlement.  
 Under Mr. Burke's direction the Doctor's craft was headed for the scene of the accident; but no traces were found of even the dories. Whilst the craft was searching for traces of the wreck, the "Hump" bore down on it, and collided with the craft amidships, cutting it in two.  
 It seems that Mr. Burke was standing in the companionway of Dr. Fitzgerald's boat, and was likely killed by the concussion. The Doctor and the Tibbo brothers were in the water some time before they were picked up, as in the darkness little could be seen. The Doctor is a great swimmer, and this doubtless accounts for his safety.  
 The tragic occurrence has cast a shroud of gloom, not only over St.

Jacques, but in the nearby settlements as all three victims were well and favorably known.  
 Mr. Ryan, who was a native of Carbonara, and brother of the late Fr. Ryan, S.J., and the late Sister Angela of St. Patrick's Convent, Riverview, had spent the greater part of his life at Long Hr. in the employ of the Anglo-American Telegraph Company. He was a man of splendid physique, a good swimmer, and his sudden passing is a mystery. The yacht was equipped with an engine, and some are under the impression that the accident might have been caused by an explosion.  
 Mr. H. R. Clinton was one of the best known residents of the South Coast. He had occupied the position of Sub-Collector at St. Jacques for many years. Though of frail physique, he was remarkable for wonderful vitality. He leaves a widow and four helpless little ones—two of them in delicate health.  
 Mr. Burke was one of the most widely known vessel masters in Fortune Bay, and spent several years in the fishery and coastal trade till his appointment as light-keeper at St. Jacques Island some three years ago. He leaves a widow and ten children.  
 A very tragic feature of the occurrence is that his eldest son is Steward of the "Hump" and he witnessed the collision which caused his father's death.

## Germany Holds Execution of Fryatt Legal

BERLIN, Aug. 4.—The execution of Captain Fryatt is declared to have been "obviously legal and right." In a statement given to The Associated Press by the German Admiralty in reply to criticism of the execution made by Sir Edward Grey.  
 The statement points out that Captain Fryatt had a lawyer to defend him, as the American Embassy was informed when it made inquiries at the request of England.  
 The Admiralty holds that England claims for herself a special code of morals and honor in sea warfare which amounts to a reversal of all reason, because it insists that merchantmen have the right to attack submarines. Germany is unwilling to submit to that code, which amounts to sacrificing the brave and heroic submarine crews to British pirates and franc-tireurs.  
 "Sir Edward Grey's statements," says the Admiralty, "says that the Admiralty's announcement is consciously designed to mislead the public. Captain Fryatt was not attempting to forestall a submarine attack which was made without warning, as the submarine was sailing on the surface and had signalled him to halt, according to the stipulations of international law. Therefore, he was not trying to save the lives of his crew, for they were not endangered."  
 "The German court martial condemned Captain Fryatt to death because he committed an act of war against Germany without being enlisted in his country's forces. He was not shot in cold blood and with premeditation, as the British government asserts, but was condemned as a franc-tireur after a formal court trial."
