Returned Men Howl Down W.J. Bryan at Massey Hall

Ex-Secretary of State Would Not Permit Offenders to be Removed by Force—Makes Statement to the Press—Well Received in Metropolitan Methodist Church

Toronto, March 1.—Shouting "What about the Lusitania?" "Get out, you dirty German!" "Samer-kraut!" singing patriotic songs, stamping with their feet, shaking their fists over the balcony railings, and ringing bells, an organized body of war veterans last night howled down William Jennings Bryan, former Secretary of State in the United States, who came to address the Dominion Alliance mass meeting in Massey Hall.

Half a battalion of civil and military policemen were present prepared to quell the disturbance, but Bryan himself refused to permit this to be done. He told Mr. R. J. Fleming, General Manager of the Toronto Railway Company, who presided, that if the returned soldiers were ejected by force he would not speak.

"Too many men are being injured on the battlefields of Europe," he exclaimed, "and I am not willing that anyone should be hurt in an effort to make it possible for me to speak. My patriotism is satisfactory to the President of the United States, it is satisfactory to the Cabinet of the United States, it is satisfactory to the Congress of the United States, and there is not one single American living under our flag who dares to say there is a drop of blood in my veins that is not loyal to my country. I don't need the endorsement of anybody anywhere else. There is not a city anywhere in the Union where there is any danger of my being interrupted."

This statement was dictated to representatives of the press, who climbed to the platform when Mr. Bryan was refused a hearing. As the reporters gathered around him with their notebooks the uproar was increased a hundredfold, but the former Secretary of State proceeded to explain his position. "I don't know if I can make myself heard to a large number, but I can make myself heard to the representatives of the press, and I beg leave to state my position to the people who will read your newspapers," he said.

"I am here in Canada as a representative of 25,000,000 American people who are banded together in various organizations for the prohibition of the liquor traffic. I have spoken at one hall after another to an audience that gave not only respectful but enthusiastic attention. I am here to speak to this audience. I find that less than five per cent. probably more nearly less than two per cent. of this audience refuses to allow the rest of the audience to hear the speech. Ordinarily those who interrupt a meeting are put out on the theory that no few people have a right to deprive an overwhelming majority of their rights to hear, but in this case I am not willing that force should be used to eject the men from the hall. I would rather that the meeting should break up than that force should be used. I am perfectly willing to lose the opportunity to speak, much as I would like to present a great subject to a great audience, rather than have said that anyone was dealt with physically for any discourtesy that might have been shown to me."

"Two days ago," he continued, "I spoke in the Legislative hall of Albany, the capital of New York State, and I have travelled through every section of the country. I have made more speeches in support of the Government in the prosecution of this war than any other public man in the United States, and I have spoken in favor of the support of everything the Government has done. I shall continue to do so. My eldest daughter is married to a British Royal Engineer and he has been in the war from the beginning, while my daughter is a Red Cross nurse, who has been nursing British soldiers in the hospitals of Cairo. One of my grandsons is a soldier; another grandson is in the Navy Department at Washington."

TECHNICAL TRAINING FOR BOYS AND GIRLS

Proper Development of Resources Will Require Skilled Labor.

(From "Conservation") Probably 100,000 boys and girls from 14 to 18 years of age annually leave school in Canada to engage in some occupation connected with manufacturing, agriculture, mining, or transportation. The present general plan of education does not provide sufficiently for these young people. They are stepping out into the world to find their way, with an almost entirely literary education, the apprentice system in our industries is almost a thing of the past, and the youth in our factories and other business organizations is left to pick up a smattering of his future occupations as best he may. Notwithstanding this, every manufacturer will agree that properly trained help is the best investment. Germany, in the past few years has amply demonstrated the value of technical training.

Canada has very important natural resources requiring capacity to develop them. What are we doing to produce this capacity? How many of our farmers' children know the qualities of soil and the proper fertilizers to use for best results? Mgr. Choquette has told us of the Belgian farmer's knowledge of his land and his scientific use of it. Can we hope to meet him on even terms? How many metal workers know the composition and working qualities of their raw materials. Do our carpenters, textile workers, employees in our ceramic and other industries know why they perform certain operations and why they secure the results they do?

We are not doing justice to the rising generation. At the close of the war, Canada will no doubt see an influx of immigrants from the European countries in competition for industrial training has put them in a position to understand the theoretical as well as the practical side of their means of livelihood. Canada will have to meet the needs of European countries in competition for trade, and to do so successfully her manufacturing and other lines of activity must utilize all trained help available; to secure this result it will be necessary to give the most important position to our foreign-born residents. We may then realize too late, that we have been unfair to our own children. Industrial training schools with night classes should be a part, and an important part, of all educational work, and attendance of pupils, up to at least 18 years of age, should be compulsory.
