

**COMMITTED
FOR TRIAL****Charged With Crime of
Theft****Case Similar to the Helen Moulton
Affair—The Old Wine and
Woman Story.**

Jennie Mack sometimes known as Mrs. Warneck was committed for trial by Magistrate Wrighton in the police court this morning on a charge of theft.

The information upon which the commitment was made, was laid by George Blondo of 43 below Hunker, and declared that Jennie Mack on the 4th day of September did steal from George Blondo the sum of \$600 in currency.

The case is one very similar to that of Helen Moulton who was tried last week and held for trial to the territorial court on a charge of stealing from John F. Burns the sum of \$400.

George Blondo was the first witness called and told the story of how it occurred. He is a miner working at 43 below on Hunker, and on the night of the 4th inst. he went to the Warneck house of which the accused is the proprietress. This roadhouse is the first one passed going up Gold Bottom. He ordered a round of drinks for the people in the barroom and to pay for it drew the roll of bills from his pocket. He had in his pocket over \$600—divided into one \$100 bill, six or seven \$50 bills, two \$20 bills, and the balance in \$10 bills. He handed the \$100 bill to the accused who was behind the bar but she could not change it, so he gave her a \$10 bill.

From the Warneck house he went to the Gold Bottom hotel in company with the accused. Going into the Gold Bottom hotel they had a couple of bottles of beer and went into a room. He fell asleep and awoke in a couple of hours. Searching his pockets he discovered that his roll of money was missing. He called for the police and had the room searched but nothing could be found. After they had been in the room a short while someone knocked at the door and the woman answered the call. He did not see who it was nor hear the conversation. The woman was intoxicated but he was sober.

Under cross-examination by the accused witness stated that Woods, Marshall and another man besides himself and the accused were present when he bought the drink at the Warneck house, but that he did not slap his money down on the bar stating that he was a successful miner making lots of money and telling how much he had in his roll.

Constable Marshall of the Gold Bottom force was next called and corroborated the previous witness in his statement of the events transpiring at the Warneck hotel. He had heard Blondo order the drink and saw him take out his roll of bills to pay for it. He did not know the amount Blondo had in his possession. He had seen Blondo and the accused leave the Warneck hotel for the Gold Bottom hotel and had not seen them again until the robbery of the robbery was made, when he went in company with another policeman and searched the room. The door was partly open, and the window also was slightly open, but the lock on the door was all right. The woman was intoxicated but the man was sober.

Mr. Varnsen, owner of the Gold Bottom hotel, the next witness, stated that Blondo and the accused had entered his hotel between 9 and 10 o'clock and had entered a room where he had served them with two bottles of beer. The first Blondo had paid for in silver, and the second he had paid for with a \$5 bill which he changed. That was all the money he had seen in the possession of Blondo. He had been relieved by his night man, Harry Foley, about 9:15 and had heard nothing further from the parties until aroused by Blondo making the outcry.

Henry Foley, night bartender, was next called. He had heard nothing from the parties and in fact did not know that they were in the room until after 1 o'clock, when he answered a call from the bell and was told by Blondo that he had been robbed and for him to call the police. A man named Wood had come into the room and taking a key off the bar had tried to open the door to the room occupied by Blondo. Witness had ordered him away and was told by Wood that there were plenty of other ways of getting in. Woods was intoxicated when he came in. He went out the back door and witness did not see him again during the evening. He had tried the door to see if Woods had opened it, but found he had not succeeded as the door was still locked. He had helped in the search of the room and found that the door was open and the window also. The window is about 3 feet from the ground. Blondo was recalled and in reply to questions put by the magistrate stated that he had not noticed the window particu-

larly but that he had not opened it and had not seen anyone else do so. Const. Marshall was also recalled and testified to seeing the window open.

The prosecution rested its case and the defense was reserved. The magistrate then committed the accused for trial at the next sitting of the criminal court.

**YUKON
COUNCIL****Enlarges Powers of the
City****May Now Compel Property Owners
to Construct Side-
walks.**

Two of the amendments to the Dawson City charter that were made by the Yukon council last week are of considerable importance, particularly that by which the powers of the city council to compel property owners to construct sidewalks in front of their premises is increased. Heretofore it has been impossible to compel the owners of property to lay walks except on certain streets, upon nearly all of which such had already been constructed. On the cross streets the owners of unimproved property could laugh at their neighbors who had perhaps built a residence and thereby improving the adjoining lots and still be compelled to walk through the mud in order to reach their homes. Things have changed now, however, and the city council will compel the laying of walks throughout the entire city. The amendment to the charter consists in the addition of the following words at the end of one of the sub-sections: "Compelling the owner or occupant of any premises in the city to construct or cause to be constructed a sidewalk as the council may by resolution direct and in such place or places on the street or streets which adjoin any such premises as the council may by resolution direct."

The other amendment referred to was made to sub-section 30 of section 137 and confers on the council the power to contract for the lighting of the city for a period not exceeding two years. The amendment is as follows: "Contract with any person or company for the lighting of the city or any part thereof with gas, electricity, oil or by any other means for any length of time, not in the first instance, exceeding two years."

Five Drowned

Battle Creek, Mich., Aug. 28.—The bodies of five employees of the Battle Creek Sanitarium, who lost their lives in Lake Gogaw last night, their bodies being run down by the steamer Welcome, were recovered today. The bodies of Lizzie Brady and Mabel Richard, a stenographer, were found floating on the water. They had evidently been killed by the collision, or else they would have sunk. The bodies of Della Dorsey, of Alhambra, Pa., Fannie Willis, of Toronto, Ont., and C. F. Bennett, of Salado, Texas, were found after the lake had been dragged for several hours. Carrie Ezyok, the other occupant of the boat, was rescued by a man who put out from shore in a row boat. She was the only one of the party who managed to catch hold of the boat after it had been overturned.

Bennett had been rowing the young women about the lake and the party was returning to the Sanitarium villa about 10 o'clock, just as the steamer Welcome was leaving her dock with an excursion party. The small boat was struck amidships and the hull crushed, all the occupants being thrown into the water. All the victims except Miss Richard were members of the new class of nurses.

Engine Demolished

Blaine, Wash., Aug. 28.—By the breaking of the crankpin the engine at the Erie Mill Co.'s shingle mill at this place yesterday the engine was completely demolished. Parts were thrown all around the engine room and that no one was injured by the accident was a miracle. The damage to the mill company will not be less than \$2,000.

FATAL ACCIDENT YESTERDAY.**Dan McKinsey and Robert Haddock Were Instantly Killed and Frank Mills Probably Will Die—The Men Had Recently Purchased a Claim and in Making Inspection of Their Property Fell Down a Shaft 114 Feet in Depth—Accident Due to Defect in Hoisting Cage.**

One of the saddest accidents that has taken place since the discovery of gold in the Klondike occurred on King Solomon's Hill yesterday at 1 p. m. The old Fax claim has always been known as a good producer, and was purchased by W. P. Brayton some time ago. Last week Wm. Glendennan, Dan McDonald and Chas. Croymon, proprietors of the Monte Cristo hotel at 28 below Bonanza, made arrangements to purchase the claim from Mr. Brayton for \$8,000. Before the deal was consummated Mr. Croymon was asked to withdraw in favor of Dan McKinsey and Robert Haddock, which Mr. Croymon cheerfully did. The four above mentioned young men had always been friends, had worked together, were steady and industrious, had saved their wages and desired to work together the coming winter. **FERRY ROAD
IS BEGUN****Leading Around Bluff to
West Dawson****To Consist Entirely of Rock Work
and Will be an Expensive
Undertaking.**

Today the department of public works will begin construction on a very important piece of road work which though it will be the shortest of all the roads so far built in the territory, less than a quarter of a mile, yet will be by far the most expensive. The little stretch of the King's highway referred to will run from the landing of the Hubrick ferry on the opposite side of the river to West Dawson following around the bluff with a very slight grade and be of the regulation width of wagon roads, connecting with the trail leading to the Sixty-mile district. There is a strong probability of the trail being widened next season so as to accommodate wagons and the road around the bluff would then have been a necessity more than it is now, though it is needed badly enough at the present time. When the cable ferry was put in operation this spring it ended sheer against the bluff and some outlet was at once required not only for pack animals but foot passengers as well. Hubrick with the assistance of private subscriptions donated by a number of the first avenue merchants built a trail leading to the top of the bluff but it is so steep that an empty wagon is a load for a team. At the meeting of the Yukon council last week a petition was presented asking for the construction of a proper road around the bluff and the council generously acceded to the request at once.

The building of the road will consist almost wholly of rock work, it being necessary to blast out the roadway from the solid and in places precipitous bluff. Ten experienced rock men are at work which is as great a number as can labor at an advantage. The number of cubic yards of rock it will be necessary to move has not been computed nor the length of time such will require, but from the character of the work it can be easily seen that it will be the most expensive road, considering its length, that has ever been constructed in the territory.

Situation Alarming.
Nanaimo, B. C., Aug. 29.—Superintendent Robins of the New Vancouver Coal Company is back from a visit to San Francisco. After looking into the coal situation there he cannot regard it as other than most alarming. This is due to the fuel oil competition, which he believes is destined to exert a great influence for some time.

dinner Messrs. McKinsey, Haddock and Glendennan, owners, and Frank Mills, an employee, started to go down the shaft. As the four men stepped onto the cage something was heard to crack. They immediately signaled the engine and examined the same to see what had happened. As no breaks could be found, the engineer was signalled to lower the cage which was sent down empty. On its return it was again examined and thought to be safe. It was then the accident occurred. Messrs. McKinsey and Haddock stepped onto the cage and it still seemed to them all right, but when Frank Mills stepped on the bottom separated from the top part of the cage and the three men went to the bottom, a distance of 114 feet. As quick as possible the men were taken up one at a time. Mr. Haddock's face was battered into an unrecognizable mass

and he was instantly killed. Mr. McKinsey lived a few minutes after being rescued, and Frank Mills, who was shortly after examined by a physician from Grand Forks, was found to have both legs and several ribs broken, and is still alive. Nothing encouraging is given out today except that while there is life there is hope. Everything possible is being done for the young man, and it is hoped that his youth and strong constitution will carry him through.

The accident is accounted for in the following manner: During the noon hour barrels of water were hoisted weighing 700 pounds, so it was certain that at that time the cage was all right. A regular trap is not used but a cross-piece is placed under the center of the cage until the load is removed. It is thought that this cross-piece instead of being placed in the center after hoisting the water, was placed on one side,

and when the four men stepped onto the cage their combined weight was too much for the mortised uprights or posts on the top, and it was the breaking of the mortises which the men heard crack but could not see when they examined the same. When the cross-piece was taken out to lower the cage the first time it was not replaced, as the men intended to go down at once, and when the third man stepped on the mortises gave way, precipitating the men to the bottom.

A gloom was spread over the whole camp, as the young men had many friends and were well and favorably known to all. Chas. Rossler, the present engineer, fell from the top of the same shaft last winter, a distance of 124 feet, and in two days was at work again.

RETURNS WITH HIS PRISONER**Detective Welch's Successful Search for La Belle Ends After Many Weeks—He Receives Many Congratulations from the Officials.**

William Welch, who has achieved an enviable reputation for his success in tracking down criminals and later in extorting from them a confession of their crimes, arrived on the Canadian Saturday night in charge of Ed. La Belle charged with being an accomplice of Peter Fourrier in the murder of Leon Douthilllette, Guy Beaudoin and Alphonse Constantine. The capture of La Belle as was stated in the telegraph columns of the Nugget some days ago, was effected in Wadsworth, Nevada, after a chase which extended across a half dozen states and territories and covered over two thousand miles. Detective Welch was met at the wharf by Sergeant Smith and Constable Egan who relieved him of his prisoner and hurried him off to the barracks. The accused is of medium height, swarthy complexion, heavy mustache and had several days' growth of beard on his face which did anything but improve his appearance. He wore a dark suit of clothes and a slouch hat which he kept pulled down over his eyes as though he wished to avoid seeing anyone he knew.

The story of his travels, his hopes and disappointments before success finally crowned his efforts, Detective Welch will not be at liberty to divulge until after he has made a full and complete report to his superior. Detectives are by nature reticent and Detective Welch is no exception to the rule. In speaking with him this morning upon things in general he made quite a bit of sport

over the alleged interview in yesterday morning's Sun. Immediately after being relieved of his prisoner Saturday night he at once went to his home and did not see a soul to speak to until the following day. The Sun story was taken from a recent issue of the P.-I. and relished to fit.

Mr. Welch has today received the congratulations of everyone from Major Wood down to the youngest constable in the service on his splendid work in effecting La Belle's arrest and later in securing from him a confession of his crime. He was greatly assisted in the work by some of the best detectives on the coast with whom he has been intimately associated during the past twenty years. Several times he lost all trace of his victim but later was enabled to pick up the scent again and followed it on and on until he had him safely landed with a pair of bracelets about his wrists.

It was rumored by other passengers on the Canadian that La Belle pointed out the island to Mr. Welch where the murders had been committed and where other evidence could be procured by diligent search, but the latter refused to either confirm or deny the rumor. The prosecution is positive they have an abundance of evidence to prove they have the right man who committed the triple murder, which with the corroboration of La Belle's confession will make it almost a certainty that the hands will be made of the late usually awarded to people of their type.

**RELATIVE
OF LA BELLE**

**Will Defend the Accused
Man**

**Now En Route to Dawson From
Quebec—Prisoner Remanded
This Morning.**

Edward La Belle, the prisoner charged with the murder of Leon Douthilllette, was arraigned in police court this morning.

La Belle is a heavy set, swarthy complexioned man, but does not impress the casual observer as being the perpetrator of a foul crime. He was represented in court this morning by J. Langlois, who stated that friends of the prisoner had wired from Ottawa asking that the interests of the prisoner be cared for temporarily by himself and attorney Noel.

La Belle has good connections in the east, a brother-in-law being a prominent barrister and member of parliament from Quebec. The latter expects to come to Dawson to defend the prisoner and pending his arrival requests that La Belle be subjected to no interviews. The prisoner was remanded for one week.

It is understood that La Belle's brother-in-law is now en route to Dawson. The crown was represented by Crown Prosecutor Congdon.

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**THE SCHEME
WAS NIPPED**

**Indians to be Robbed
of Land**

**U. S. Interior Department Will
Take Measures to Prevent
Frauds.**

Washington, Aug. 30.—William A. Jones, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, thinks he has nipped in the bud a scheme that promised to develop a steal of \$10,000,000 or \$20,000,000 worth of Indian lands and cause one of the worst scandals the interior department has had to deal with. Commissioner Jones admits there is a chance yet for the Indians to be robbed by the instigators of this scheme, but says he will do everything in his power to prevent it.

Many large syndicates have been organized throughout the west to purchase the lands formerly owned by the Indians, which are now in the hands of the government; that is, they cannot be disposed of without the approval of the interior department. Many thousands of acres are valued at from \$1 to \$60 an acre.

In many instances attempts have been made by these syndicates to induce the Indian agent at the reservation to furnish them with all the descriptions and also names of the heirs.

A big firm in Nebraska, in which a number of prominent public men are interested, made an attempt to secure from the agent at the reservation near Omaha the description of 70,000 acres and the names of the heirs of the dead allottees.

This syndicate contemplated purchasing the land for about one-tenth of its value and selling it to settlers on the mortgage plan for about \$50 an acre.

American Railroads.

A rich agricultural region in South Korea is about being opened up by a 287-mile railroad, to be built at a cost of \$12,500,000. American railway material is to be used, and American implements will probably be employed to increase the agricultural product of that land. Japanese dictation is paramount in that country.

Decrease in Birth Rate.

London, Aug. 30.—Sociologists are disturbed by the vital statistics just issued, showing a marked decline in the English birthrate. London shows a decrease since 1881 from 27.4 to 20.6 per hundred married women under the age of 45. The decline is most noticeable in the fashionable quarters of the capital, while the slum areas, such as Stepney, Shadwell and Bethnal Green are almost stationary. Outside of London the decline amounts to 25.8 against 30.3 in 1881.

**Forest Fires Create Big
Loss**

**Eleven Lives Lost and 200 People Lose All of Their
Property.**

Portland, Ore., Sept. 15.—Oregon forest fires have wrought incalculable damage and still continue. From Ariel, Clatsop county, Washington, to the foot of Mount St. Helens, a distance of 25 miles, eleven are dead and four missing, while more than 200 are homeless, many with nothing to wear. The dead in Clatsop county so far as known are: D. L. Wallace, wife and two children; John Pollock, brother and child; W. E. Newhouse, and Mrs. Graves. Four men working a claim for Jas. Hawthorne are missing. Fifty or sixty people camping near a lake at the foot of Mt. St. Helens have not been heard from since the fire. Milo M. Dimrick brought the first reports to Portland this morning after terrifying adventures.

Paris, Sept. 1.—A dispatch to the Liberte from Rome, published today, announces that the Italian premier, Signor Zanardelli, has been suddenly taken ill and that he is now confined to his bed.

Confesses to Murder.
Colchester, Eng., Sept. 1.—At the police court here today Lance-Corporal Lloyd of the Bigfordshire regiment, who had surrendered to the authorities charging himself with the murder of an unknown man in Kansas City, Mo., in January last, was remanded for a warrant after formal evidence had begun. Lloyd, who claims to be an American citizen, in his confession to the police says his real name was Wm. G. B. Toll of Kansas City; that he was married and that he was a deserter from the United States army. The prisoner further asserted that he did not know the name of the man he had killed. His object was robbery and he knocked the man on the head with a coupling pin.

**BIG MEAT
COMBINE**

**All Interests Are Now
United**

**Biggest Trust in the United States

Chicago, Sept. 15.—The long expected merger of the meat packing interests of the United States will go into force Sept. 27. This industrial combination will be second only to the steel trust in magnitude.

To Impeach Palma
Havana, Aug. 29.—President Palma today finds himself without the support of a single newspaper controlled by Cubans. The editorial published in the Cuban press are, considered collectively, remarkable for their bitterness and outspoken opposition to the chief executive. The only paper which supports the president is the Diario de la Marina, formerly the organ of the Spanish government and at present representing the Spanish colony in Cuba.

One of the principal causes for the opposition to President Palma seems to arise from the fact that he granted the Castaneda concession for the establishment of an electric light plant at Havana. This concession has been a subject of bitter discussion in the house of representatives and some members are demanding Senator Palma's impeachment unless the concession matter has been upon the table for the past week. Both houses of congress have become badly disorganized over this question and the result has been a strong anti-Palma feeling.

Loses Her Heart
San Francisco, Aug. 30.—Carefully guarded in a flat at 1315 Stockton street, is pretty Senorita Jesus Rea, daughter of a rich Senor of Mazatlan, Mexico. She was brought from the Mexican coast city in the charge of her grandmother and her trip here is in the hope of putting to an end a pretty romance. She had lost her heart to a dashing tenebrous, Miguel Calteja, who is famous in the arena in Old Spain and in Central and South American republics.

The father of the maid is wealthy and famous in his locality as a sculptor. He, like most of his countrymen, is an admirer of bull fighting, and in the interests of national sport he constructed an elaborate arena for the game and it is known all up and down the Mexican coast as the Plaza Rea and the headquarters of the most daring matadors.

Senor Luis Rea induced Calteja, who had become famous in the provinces of Spain under the name of "Colerin," to come to Mazatlan and exhibit his skill and he soon became the lion of the fashionable sets of the coast towns. Rea admired his skill and the famous tenebrous was a frequent caller at the home of the wealthy sculptor. He was as skillful at love making as he was at killing bulls, and it was not long before his host found that he had won the heart of his daughter.

He was forbidden to call again at the Rea home. The daughter pined for her banished lover and an elopement was planned. That was frustrated and a few days later the pretty girl in the case of her grandmother, was placed on board the steamer Curacao and sent away in the expectation that her lover would not follow.

Stage Coach Overturned.
Livingston, Mont., Aug. 30.—Miss May Leonard of Chicago sustained a broken collar bone and Joseph Baird of St. Louis and eleven other passengers received a severe shaking up as the result of the overturning of a stage coach between Mammoth Hot Springs and Gardiner this evening. The driver lost control of his team, which plunged over the embankment, pulling the coach over, which, after making two complete revolutions, fortunately landed right side up. It is claimed to be almost miraculous that the entire party was not killed. The only fatality was among the horses, one of which was killed.

THE FIRST**

**King of the Island of
Tiburon**

**Arizona Charley Has Assumed the
Royal Title—Plans for Inva-
sion Completed.**

Arizona Charley has written to a number of Dawson people requesting them to participate in his proposed expedition against the Island of Tiburon. Charley has secured a steamboat, plenty of provisions, has a complete arsenal ready for action and is prepared to take the island by peaceful means if possible and by force if necessary.

The last mail brought to Frank Slavina the following letter on the subject:

San Diego, Aug. 30.
Dear Frank,—I am here on international business regarding my Tiburon trip. Everything looks good. I start October 1st.

I have the best and swiftest boat that floats, and just had a wire from the governor of Sonora, who says I can have all the Mexican soldiers I want and that he will go along if possible. Wish you were here to attend to all this business. A prime minister in Dawson is no good to me.

King Charles of Tiburon.
A Los Angeles paper gives a picture of the steam yacht which will convey the expedition and contains also the appended account of Charley's doings.

A number of the men slated to accompany Charley, who are now in Dawson, will need to hurry, a bit if they do not get left.

The article in question reads: as follows:

Avalon, Aug. 28.—Catalina has many celebrated people among its visitors. From year to year, but it cannot often boast of entertaining royalty. Whether born a King or not, no one on the island attracts so much attention on the street as "Arizona Charley," who in private life is Charles "Meadows," and who now signs himself "King of Tiburon."

He is a striking character of almost gigantic frame, standing six feet four inches in his stockings, broad-shouldered, though spare in flesh, and every inch a typical frontiersman. He was born in Tulare county, though nearly his whole life has been spent in Arizona among the Indians, as cowboy, government scout, miner, Indian fighter and Wild West showman, in which capacity he has twice traveled around the world.

Mr. Meadows wears the title of "King of Tiburon" jocularly among his friends by reason of his having come into possession of the Island of Tiburon through purchase of two-thirds of the island and lease of the other one-third from the Mexican government. Only a few days since he received his deed, which will put him nominally in possession of the island, so far as the Mexican government is concerned. To give him peaceable possession, however, was more than the Mexicans assumed, and it is now up to "Arizona Charley" to get possession and make his title of King good, and this may be a larger contract than it appears. The larger contract, who inhabit the island, are savages who have never been conquered. At least four expeditions to the island have fallen victims to the poisoned arrows of the natives and for hundreds of years the Mexican and Spanish governments have not been able to exercise any authority over them, and Mr. Meadows will undoubtedly have more tales of adventure added to those of his eventful life before he occupies the Tiburon throne.
