London, Oct. 17.—The election returns yesterday do not change the results, and the final figures, with the exception of the Orkney Islands, leave the Government a net gain of a single seat. The total number of members of Parliament elected is 660, as follows:—Ministerials. 400; Opposition, 269. # AMBUSHED THEM.

Bethune's Mounted Infantry

Play the Boer's Game. n Entire Commando Wiped Out-Many of the Belligerents

Surrendering. London, Oct. 17 .- A Durban despatch says :- Near Vryhead, a Boer commando was taken in ambuscade by Bethuen's mounted infantry, the Boers losing 60 killed, 35 wounded and 65

taken prisoners. A Pretoria despatch says:-Commandant Muller, with a number of burghers, has surrendered to the British in Standerton, The remainder of the commando, it is said, intended to hold out until yesterday, when they would also surrender if they were not joined by a large force of Americans, who it was said would arrive on that day to aid them.

Commandant Erasmus is coming in to arrange terms of surrender. Gens. Barton and Clemens have sur Gens. Barton and Clemens have surrounded a commando on Zwart Kop, and it is expected that the whole force will be captured. The British at last reports were shelling them, and had killed and wounded a number. Some prisoners had been taken. Gens. Barton and Clemens fought for three days to drive the Boers into the position they are trying to hold.
