THE REVIVAL.—The renewed interest in the Baptist church continues. Last Sunday morning sixteen were received into fellowship. CAMBRIDGE.—Special services have been held at Cambridge by the pastor, Rev. D. Pitce, for the last three weeks with good results. Two candidates were baptized on Sunday March 17th and six more on Sunday March 24th.

PREACHING IN ANNAPOLIS.—Mr. C. W. Eaton, of the College, preached in the Baptist church, Annapolis, on Sunday last. His subject was "What is the matter with the world."—Rev. R. D. Ross preached in the Annapolis Presbyterian church last Sunday morning and evening.

THE YARMOUTH.—The steamer Yarmouth did not leave Boston on Tuesday morning but remained over till today. After April 1st she will make her regular two trips a week, leaving Yarmouth on Wednesday and Saturday evenings; returning leave Lewis' wharf, Boston, every Tuesday at 10 a. m.

MAPLE.—Levi S. Trimmer, of Clear entsvale, tapped six maple trees on the 26th January and obtained four pails of sap, with which he made two pounds of sugar, realizing \$4 cents. This, we believe, is unprecedented in the history of the County. What does the oldest inhabitant say?—Annapolis Spectator.

THE BAY SERVICE.—The steamer City of Montreal, which is to go on the route between Annapolis and St. John, is said to be a good carrier and just the boat for the service. She will probably be a popular boat. Her dimensions are: Length over all, 232 feet; breadth of beam, 32 feet; depth of hold, 10.9 feet; her gross tonnage is 478 tons.

THE EXHIBITION.—Kentville is deeply interested in holding a county Exhibition next fall, and a meeting was held in the Court House on Monday of last week to further that object. It is thought that Hants and Annapolis will unite with Kings. Why not? Kings joined with Hants in making the exhibition here a success, and one good turn deserves another. Besides, with three counties united there will be a large prize list, and much good will be accomplished by the larger competition among the farmers. The Journal heartily joins in the movement. We would like to have the Exhibition here, but we must not be selfish. We hope our farmers will lend their aid to the enterprise with right good will.—Hants Journal.

The Chignecto-Marine Railway. The Dominion Chignecto Marine Railway will be an important work when finished. By means of this road ships of all sizes and sorts, full laden, will be carried across the neck of land that separates the Gulf of the St. Lawrence from the Bay of Fundy, distance 17 1/2 miles. The vessel to be drawn from one body of water to the other is floated into a receiving dock at one end of the road. The dimensions of this dock are 500 ft. long, 300 ft. wide. Adjoining this is the lifting dock, which is 250 ft. long and 60 ft. wide. From the receiving basin the vessel is floated into the lifting dock. There she is securely placed in a "cradle."

The hydraulic lifts then raise the ship, cradle and all, a height of forty feet on the rails. The cradle is really the car on which the ship is conveyed across the isthmus. The railway will be a double track of steel rails. The rails are very heavy, weighing 110 lbs. to the yard. So the cradle will run on 4 lines of rails instead of two.

It is expected that it will take two hours and a half to convey the ship from water to water. This includes the hoisting and lowering at each terminus. When finished it will save vessels a long and dangerous sail. The contractor are at work and when the spring comes their force of men will be greatly increased. It is estimated to cost five and a half millions of dollars.
