A handsome new Baptist church is to be formally dedicated at Amherst on Sunday next. The preacher will be Rev. Dr. Sawyer, Rev. G. O. Gates, Rev. W. W. Weeks. There will be five stained glass windows, one the gift of six of the deacons, one the gift of Sir Charles Tupper, in memory of his father, another by W. A. March, Quebec, in memory of his father, Rev. Mr. March, a fourth by G. Balford Smith, and a fifth by Mrs. A. E. Black, in memory of her father, another husband and sister. Mrs. W. M. Black has presented four silver crosses.

Public schools resumed work on Monday with a good attendance.

Miss Emma M. Huxford (dressmaker) is prepared to do dressmaking in the latest styles at her home in Ayerport.

The Acadia Edison Electric Co. is having a brick smoke-stack constructed to take the place of the iron one they have had in use and which has proved inefficient. The new stack will be 7 1/2 feet square at the base and about 70 feet high. At the top it will be 3 1/2 feet square. So far as we remember this will be the first brick stack constructed in the county.

We understand that arrangements are being made for holding a shooting tournament in Wolfville about the last of September. Already nearly sufficient money has been subscribed to procure a handsome cup for competition, and the promoters will probably have no difficulty in providing other prizes. This movement should have the support of all interested in the town.

The handsome steam yacht *Huna*, owned by Mr. A. T. Armour, of New York, which has been cruising about in Nova Scotia waters for about a month, anchored in Minas Basin on Friday last and in the afternoon Mr. Armour and a number of friends, who are on board as his guests, came ashore in a trim little gasoline launch. Several of the number took the evening express for Halifax, arriving back by the Bluenose on Saturday, when they were at once conveyed seaward again. The *Huna* is commanded by Capt. J. H. Crawford, and carries a crew of eighteen men. The party expressed themselves as greatly pleased with their trip, and spoke enthusiastically of the beauties of the "Land of Evangeline." The next point at which they will land will be St. John, and from there to Bar Harbor and home.

Board of Trade.

The ACADIAN has frequently referred to the desirability of the formation of a Board of Trade in this place. Just now there appears to be a likelihood of some move in this direction. The recent convention in Halifax has directed the attention of our people to it more forcibly. At a meeting held last Friday evening the matter was discussed, and it was thought best to form a board in which all the interests of the county could be represented. With this end in view the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved that Mayor Bigelow, W. H. Chase and R. W. Starr be a committee to issue a circular letter, calling a meeting of the merchants, farmers and others, representing all sections in Kings County, for the purpose of forming a Kings County Board of Trade.

We trust that the cooperation of all interested in the welfare of the county may be secured, and that the object aimed at may be successfully attained.
