Wider Tires Needed.

Farmers have more reason to agitate for good roads than any other class, not even excepting bicyclers. Good roads for the farmer mean economy in reaching markets; often better markets, because they could be reached at the right time; advantages of social life in the winter and early spring, saving in time and in the wear and breakage of wheeled vehicles, and a general advance that pertains to a higher state of civilization.

Bicyclers are doing much to promote good roads. Now is the time for our farmers to make a positive move in co-operation with them.

One improvement most go along with that of better construction and drainage of roads. The wheels of all vehicles should have wider tires. In France the width of the tire is from three to ten inches, with the bulk of four-wheeled vehicles six inches. In Germany every heavy load must have at least four inch tires; Austria requires a tire of four and a half inches wide; Switzerland requires all draft wagons to have a six inch tire. If we were to build good roads our wagons, as now constructed, would speedily destroy them.

They are not destroyers as certainly as the built-up wheels of our present day, although they begin at once to reform the wheels.

Washington's Feats.

Lord Russell's visit to America reminds us of an ancient story. During Lord Russell's previous tour in this country, with Lord Coleridge, he came in contact with many members of the bar, including Mr Everts. It was while walking with Mr Everts along the banks of a stream, that his attention was called to a point at which Washington, according to tradition, had thrown a dollar right across. The water was wide, and Lord Russell looked doubtful.

You know a dollar went further in those days than it goes now. The American lawyer blantly inquired:

Ah, said Lord Russell, quite equal to the occasion, and it may have been as much as Washington; it is well known that he threw a sovereign across the Atlantic.
