## PLANS UNDERWAY FOR "MADE-IN-CANADA" CAMPAIGN

Montreal, Aug. 16.—Plans are under way by the Quebec division of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association for a "Made in Canada" campaign, to be conducted at the sixty local fall fairs, and the four provincial fairs during this Autumn. Arrangements are being made for this by R. W. Gould, secretary of the provincial division, and a member of the staff will visit the fairs, distributing "Made in Canada" cards, with literature showing the advantage of buying Canadian made goods and furnishing employment for Canadians, instead of sending \$300,000,000 a year abroad to purchase foreign goods that could well be made in Canada.

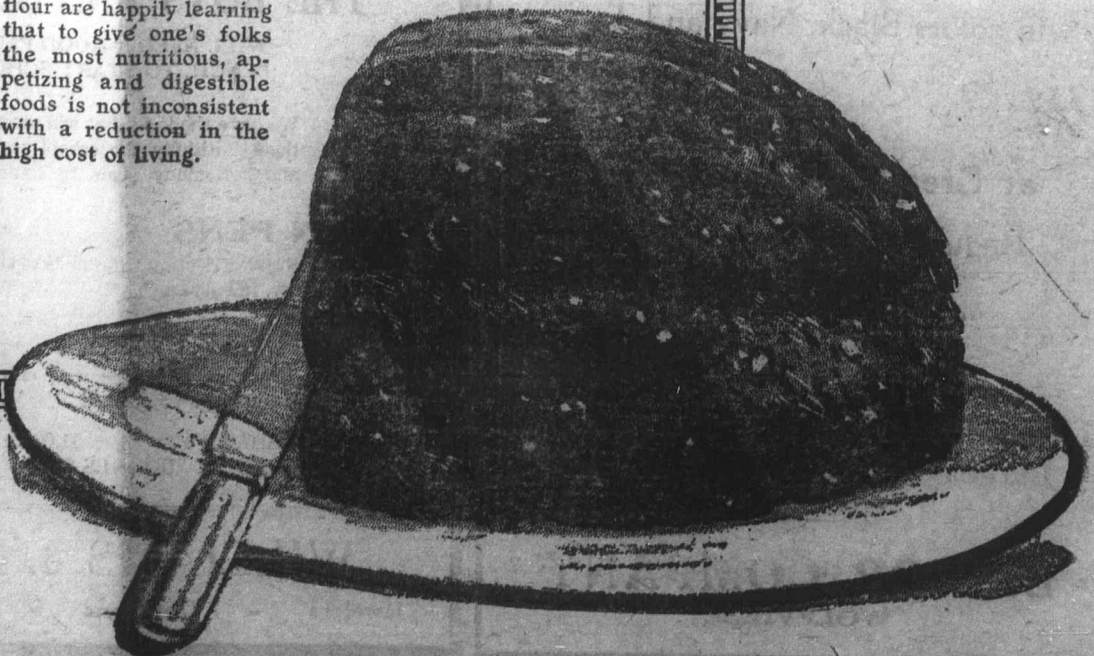
