Trouble at Taber.

It would appear from the following clipping out of the Taber Free Press that there is trouble brewing for someone in Taber:

Early Tuesday morning, in fact before nine o'clock, the members of the new council were sworn in. They then appointed R. P. Wallace, clerk and treasurer pro tem.

Mr. David Burbank who has been the Overseer of the village of Taber presented the books, papers and cash in his possession to the council. These were carefully gone over and were found satisfactory. The Trustees of the village not being present with their books, papers, etc., the Mayor, Mr. Barton and Mr. Wallace were appointed a committee to wait upon Mr. W. F. Russell, the secretary of the Trustee Board to request that a statement be presented and that all books and papers be turned over to the Council forthwith. We understand that Mr. Russell said that he had no statement to present and that he was going away for three weeks when he would be back. Mayor Truswell then advised him that he was not to leave the country until he had presented the statement and the books and papers relating to the village. The council then met and decided to take action to prevent the Trustees from leaving the country. The Attorney General's department at Edmonton was communicated with and the result was that Mr. Russell and Mr. VanOrman were put under bonds not to leave the country and Mr. Probert who had gone to Raymond to spend a day before going to Taber, was also put under bonds. We understand the preliminary hearing will take place here on Monday.

Passenger Rates Reduced

It will be remembered that in our last issue we spoke of the visit of Messrs Woolf, Jelliff and Woolford to Lethbridge on the occasion of the Sitting of the Royal Railway Commission at that point. As a result of the same the Commission has issued orders (which are now in effect) that the passenger rates on the Alberta Railway and Irrigation Company's Line shall be reduced from 5 to 4 cents per mile with the usual reduction for the purchase of Round Trip tickets. It is also ordered that the local freight rates shall be the same as those on the Mountain Section of the C. P. R. The mandate of the Commission is to the effect that another reduction may be made in the passenger rate provided that it can be found that the earnings of the Company warrant the same.

The Board of Trade is to be complimented for their aggressive and prompt action in the matter and the delegates, Messrs Martin Woolf, L. H. Jelliff and Thomas Woolford, should receive a hearty hand shake for the good work performed.

Anthrax and Blackleg

The disease known as blackleg in cattle, although entirely unknown in many extensive agricultural sections of Canada, and not at all wide-spread in any district or province, annually causes quite extensive loss to cattle raisers. Anthrax, which is quite a different disease, although frequently confused with blackleg in the minds of many cattle raisers, is also the cause of serious loss of stock. The former disease is almost entirely confined to cattle under three years, and is generally fatal. The latter attacks other classes of farm animals and the human subject is not exempt from its infection

By the aid of science cattle raisers It is due to the fact that these are now enabled to protect their preparations are now being made stock against these maladies, at the biological laboratory in connection with the Health of Animals Branch that they can be supplied at 5 cents per dose. The vaccine for blackleg may be administered by any intelligent person by means of an instrument supplied by the department at 50 cents. Anthrax vaccine, which is also supplied at 5 cents per dose, is more difficult to administer, requiring a qualified veterinarian to treat an animal. Cattle raisers who have fear of an attack of either blackleg or anthrax would do well to apply to the veterinary director general at Ottawa for the proper dose for blackleg vaccine and 14 preventive treatment.
