### CAMPBELL PARTY MET A CYCLONE

of mud and sand. Then we struck Garden City, Syracuse, Kan., and camped at La Junta, Colo., Sept. 29. Passed Trinidad and by a good road over the top to Raton City. Passed next day Los Vegas, San Jose, and camped at Santa Fe. Pouring rain, but telephoned ahead and found that the sun was shining in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and we started on. Camped at Socorro, altitude 4615. Other high points were Magdalena, 6568, and Springville, Arizona, 6864, arriving Oct. 5, Flagstaff, Ariz., Oct. 4, Kingman, Oct. 5, Ludlow, Calif., Oct. 6.

At Ludlow we met Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Burns of Fort Fairfield and Fred Perry of Connell. The hotel keeper and his wife were here from Bangor, so we had quite a home party. Up to this time we had only four punctures in one right hand tire, all due to nails. Picked up two more at this camp, making six punctures on the trip. The front tires have the Bangor air in them yet.

We left Ludlow Oct. 7 and drove to Barstow, over a rough lava bed. But when we turned toward San Bernardino we had 20 miles of paved road all down hill and on this we coasted without gas. From there to Redlands, Mecca, and to Brawley, 69 feet below sea level, just 13 miles from Lin Shaw's ranch, which we reached Oct. 8, just 25 days from the time we left home.

We travelled 4044 miles from Earl Campbell's house; used 274 gallons of gas and one gallon of oil; 178 hours of actual running time, and av-

The many friends of Wilmet Broad will be pleased to know that he is recovering from his recent illness.

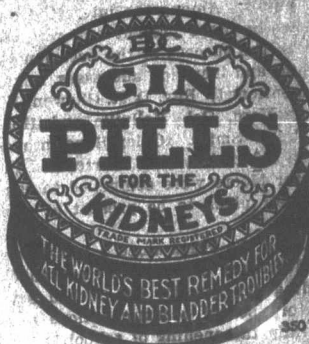
Rev. C. S. Young held service in the United Baptist church Sunday evening which as usual was largely attended.

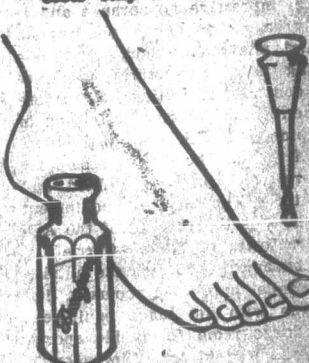

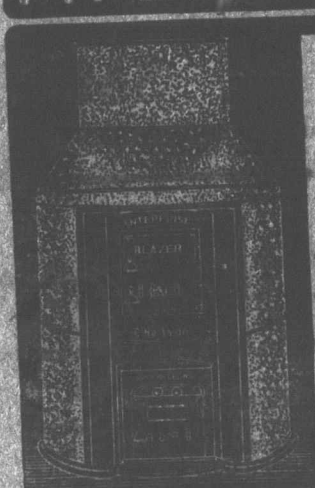
